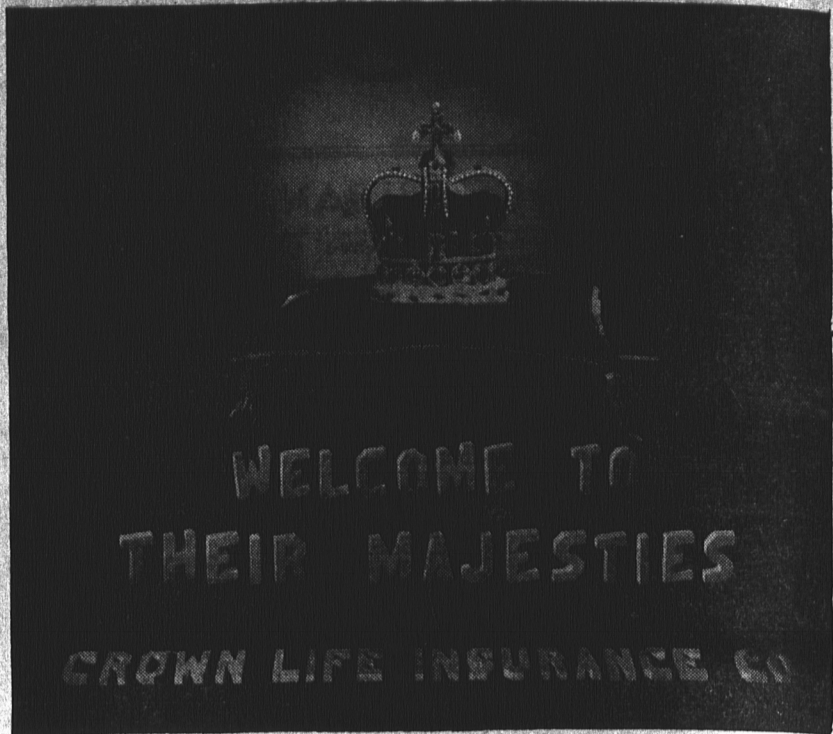

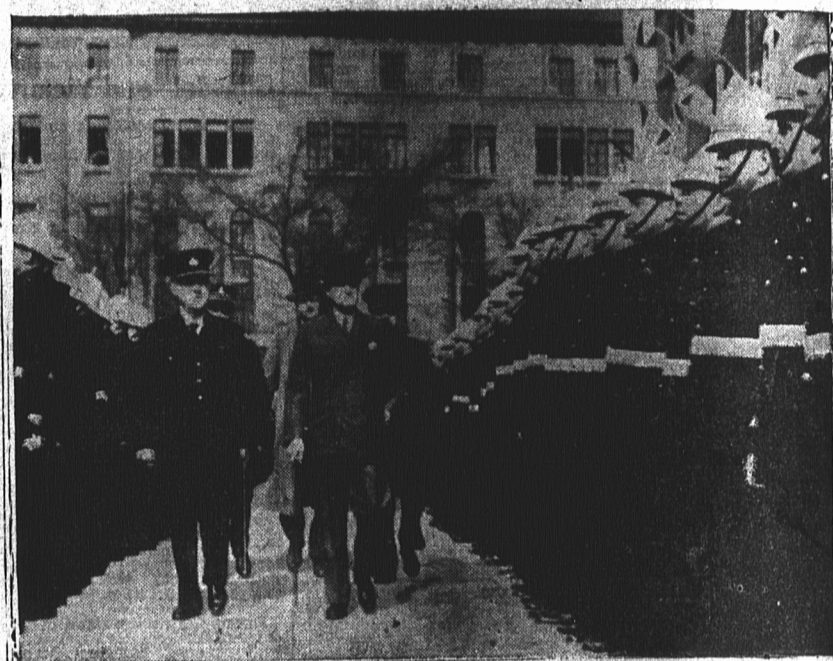

PARTY CAPTURES DEER THAT BARK

BOMBAY, June 12.—(CP)—Mystery of the barking deer, one of the least known of animals, has at last been solved by the Vernay-Cutting Zoological Expedition, which included British and American natural scientists, says the India News Bulletin. "On the Burmese hinterland, the expedition secured two specimens, male and female, of black barking deer and a number of skins and skeletons. As far as is known there is not a single specimen in any museum. Existence of the deer was known 15 years ago. The animal has been so called because to all appearances it is black, although actually it is a deep steel-gray. The expedition also secured 1,200 specimens of small animals, 1,500 specimens of birds and 2,000 specimens of plants of 80 different species. It has an example of the Chinese coffin tree, over which there has been considerable discussion.
