Quebec, Jan. 14.—John L. Mesurier, the new Mayor, was inaugurated last night.

Eight men of the wrecked ship Woodstock, have arrived from Mount Lewis. Five were left behind, being too ill to travel.

Toronto, Jan. 13.—John C. Fox, manufacturer of Canadian pianos, died in Kingston this morning.

The value of importations at Toronto for half year ending on 31st, were \$1,007,403. Exports, \$1,448,910.

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—Great fire here last night on corner of Eileen and Sussex streets, five stores and several dwellings consumed.

The Ottawa Times of Saturday morning says, that the Upper Canadians would not pull a trigger to keep Nova Scotia into the Union a day longer than she desired.

Whatever Imperial Government may do, Canada will acquiesce in it; that is a question for the Dominion Parliament, but should Great Britain grant it, Canada would be consoled by saving a large expenditure on Intercolonial Railway, which would then only go to St. John, N. B.

London, Jan. 17.—The Turkish Government is seeking to raise a loan in the English market, the proceeds of which are to be applied to improving navigation at the mouth of the Danube.

Advices from Hong Kong and Shanghai have been received, which state that another battle had been fought between the rebels and Imperialists at Shanghai. The Imperialist army which was under the command of Fung was again defeated.

Cork, Jan. 17.—A riot of explosive fluid, known as Greek fire, was thrown yesterday at one of the witnesses for the Government in the Fenian trials; but the material failed to ignite, and no injury was done. No clue has been obtained to the perpetrator.

Dublin, Jan. 17.—At the examination of Lennon yesterday, sergeant Kelly, the survivor of the two policemen who were shot at Cheapside, and a woman, both aware that they fully recognized the prisoner as the man who fired the pistol shot which wounded one policeman and killed another.

London, Jan. 18.—When the Canard steamer Scotia, from New York for Liverpool, entered the port of Queenstown late last night for the usual transfer of the London and Irish passengers and mails, a strong police force quietly went aboard and arrested Messrs. George Francis Train, Grinnell and Gee, three of the passengers who sailed for New York. It is understood that these men were taken into custody on the charge of being active members of the American branch of the Fenian organization.

These proceedings, naturally enough, caused considerable excitement here, and elsewhere throughout the Kingdom, and especially among American residents.

The Prussian Diet passed a bill for a Railway loan of forty millions.

A strict search of the person and baggage of George Francis Train disclosed no proofs of complicity with the Fenians, or justifying his arrest by the British police on suspicion. Train asserts that he came over to England as the special correspondent in Ireland of the New York World. He was personally protected through the United States Consul against his detention.

Montreal, Jan. 20.—Further developments in regard to Henry, the liquor dealer, who absconded to the States, show that the loss to the Customs, through his operations, amount to 120,000 dollars. A portion of his cellar was set apart as a bonded warehouse. It is supposed that he drew liquor by means of a siphon pump, disposing of it on the ground floor, subsequently substituting water for the liquor. There are nearly two hundred similar bonded warehouses in this city, and some reform in this system is loudly called for.

London, Jan. 19.—The police of Limerick have made a seizure of guns and ammunition found in the shops of that city, to put it out of reach of the Fenians.

Dr. Water, another Editor of the Dublin Irishman, has been arrested, but the particular charge is not stated. It is supposed, however, to be complicity with the Fenian movement. Mike Larratte, who is positively known to be the party who fired the fuse at the Clerkenwell explosion, has been arrested at Glasgow, and brought to London in irons. A man named Clancy has been arrested in this city, charged with firing upon the police. A Fenian manifesto was found this morning posted on the walls of the Mansion house, where it had been posted despite the vigilance of the police, who have no clue to the perpetrators of this daring act. The boldness or audacity of Fenians in face of the vigorous measures of repression which have been adopted excites much uneasiness.

Kuhn has been appointed Austrian Minister of war. The remains of the late Emperor Maximilian arrived at Vienna on the 18th, by a special train from Trieste, in charge of a military escort. The train was met upon its arrival by the Austrian officials, a large body of troops, and a vast crowd of people who had assembled to give expression to their respects for the dead, and their sympathy with the living. The remains were formally received by the Imperial family at the palace. The manifestation of popular feeling was intense.
