and once to the House of Commons. His son Harry D. McLean, who died last month, took over the fight for representation in the provincial house when Mr. McLean senior was called to the Senate in 1953. Harry D. McLean was elected at every election for 20 years from 1915 until 1955 when he was the last Conservative to fall before a Liberal tide that swept the province in 1955. Mr. McLean was elected in 1955 and he was again in the posted returns until almost the last poll was in. Many observers on both sides of politics were wondering that night just what a one-man opposition could do in the obvious impossibility of facing 20 men on the Liberal benches. It finally the last returns counted Mr. McLean and he was possibly relieved to find that he was relieved of what would obviously have been an untenable situation. Mr. McLean told this paper last night that he would like to retire from politics at the present time, owing to the pressure of business. The survey campaign promises to be particularly difficult, he suggested, with the Christmas rush of business coming on. But his party understandably does not want to lose the veteran competitor. Mr. McLean is ready to retire if someone shows up to take his place but the PCs in First Kings are definitely not looking for a replacement.

Norad Prescribed
To Rotary Club

Major Orin Simons, province civil defence co-ordinator, was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of Rotary held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday. Brig. W. Reid, Story co-chairman, was inducted by the subject "Air Defences of Norad". Major Orin Simons said that the guarding of the North American continent against air attack is the job of Norad, the North American Air Defence Command. From its headquarters in Colorado Springs, Norad will control a worldwide air of Canada and the United States' air defence forces. The third opening is an escape hatch. Two Groups Were Last
Evening Given a Vivid World
Picture of the Life of a Mis-
sionary in China and the West
Indies, when the Park Royal
C.G.I.T. and congregation heard
addresses by Miss Jean Sum-
merville, formerly of Saint
John, N.B., who is now on a
speaking tour of the Island.

Missionary Describes
Work in China, Trinidad

Miss Jean Summerville, a native of Saint John, N.B., who for the past 39 years has been a foreign missionary, arrived in Prince Edward Island during the weekend to begin a two-week speaking tour of the province. Last evening Miss Summerville gave talks to two groups at Park Royal United Church. The first was to the Park Royal Canadian Girls in Training group and following a brief break she then spoke to the general congregation. In both lectures she gave her audience a vivid description of her life in the mission fields in China and in Trinidad. Out of 29 years in the China service, Miss Summerville actually spent a little more than 24 years, and the remainder of the time was taken up by three leave breaks. Her final field of endeavor, which has lasted for the past 10 years has been in Trinidad, where she found life far more tranquil than it was under the various regimes which controlled China during her service there. Up until a short time before Paris Harbor, Miss Summerville served in the missions at Honan in the northern portion of the country. She said that prior to Pearl Harbor the work got around that British nations were to be interested, but she and other missionaries managed to leave the area controlled by the Japanese, and moved their operations to Kwang-yang in Southwest China. She remained in this field until 1952, the last two years of which were under the Communist rule, which she said placed heavy restrictions on the activities of the foreign missionaries. After a nine month leave of absence, Summerville was posted to Trinidad, where she said there is still a great deal of work for those in her calling. Following her current lecture Miss Summerville is hoping to proceed into retirement, and will most likely return to her native Saint John home.
