ANOTHER CHANCE.

Recruits Wanted for Service at Halifax, N. S.

The District Officer will enroll thirty militiamen for service at Halifax to relieve the regular troops now stationed there. The period of enrollment will be for a year not exceeding one year.

The pay will be the same as that of the active militia.

The qualifications are:

- (a) Age—between the ages of 18 and 45 years.
- (b) Chest measurement, minimum—34 inches.
- (c) Height, minimum—5 feet 5 inches.
- (d) To pass the required medical examination.
- (e) To be unmarried.
- (f) To be enrolled in a corps of active militia, and to have performed at least one annual training.

Enrollment will begin at the orderly rooms, drill shed, on Monday next, at two o'clock, p. m.

The three vacancies will be filled this afternoon.

NEW PRINCE OF WALES.

The Formal Opening Last Evening.

Long before eight o'clock the Assembly Hall, brilliantly decorated with the Empire's flags and the Stars and Stripes, was completely filled with students and others, the former from time to time giving their college call.

About eight o'clock Governor McIntyre took the chair, in a few remarks he noted the differences between the old and new colleges and congratulated the Professors and students upon acquiring their splendid new building. Premier Farquharson, spoke for the Board of Education, as President, and for the Government. He explained the construction of the College in a very clear manner and its advantage over the plan submitted to the Government at first in which there was no Assembly Hall. The College, as it is, has over 3000 square feet more floor space than if built by the first plan, and costs about the same—\$36,000. Premier Farquharson also reviewed the history of the College.

Dr. Anderson expressed the immense satisfaction that prevailed through the changed order of things. While this was so, there were a few things still wanting. The college needed a professor of French and German, and much better equipped laboratories. He referred to the students' fee as having been imposed to meet the interest of the cost of the new college, and always paid without the slightest hesitation. Another need of the college was an excellent library. In this connection he called upon former students not to forget their alma mater. He hoped that in the near future the curriculum would be extended so that Prince of Wales would confer the degree of B. A. or M. A. on her students.

Dr. Anderson read a telegram from former students of Prince of Wales College at McGill who congratulated the professors and the students upon the opening.

Rev. Father McLellan, rector of St. Dunstan's College, spoke on behalf of St. Dunstan's, and referred to the great friendship between the two colleges recently evidenced. He outlined the history of his institution and showed its close connection with Prince of Wales. He congratulated all concerned upon the new college.

Mr. D. A. McKinnon, Attorney-General, thought that a professor of French and German was a requisite, and read the statute providing for one. A professor of philosophy was also desirable.

Mr. Macleod, Superintendent of Education, very clearly showed the standing of the Island in comparison with the other Provinces in regard to educational matters. He contended that the Island was in respect to education ahead of some other parts of Canada.

The addresses were interspersed with singing and instrumental music. Miss Earle sang splendidly Rule Britannia and the Absent-Minded Beggar. The male quartette by the students was excellently rendered. Prof. Caven sang to perfection A Hundred Pipers. The choruses by four young men and four young women students was an enjoyable number. Prof. Vinnicombe gave two excellent violin selections. The audience dispersed after singing God Save the Queen.

Before and after the opening many visitors inspected the building, and admired its excellent arrangement and convenience.

A very enjoyable dance was held after the opening ceremonies.
