This beautiful horse was purchased by Mapco Stables and was consigned by Herbert Buchanan of Fredericton, P. E. I. He is a near neighbor to the horses owned by the writer at the Charlottetown track and is in the stable of Emmett Bernard. We have watched him work and timed him an easy mile very close to 2.19. He is good gaited, has a lot of speed and gives every indication of being a good horse in his class.

About the best liked green trotter at the track is Muriel E. by Smooc Harvester, in the Lorne Kelly stable. She seems to improve with each workout and has been easy miles around 2.25. Owner

McCloskey has had one fight since returning from the U.S. and lost to a heavier Doug Harper in a fight for the Canadian lightweight crown. Coby, down to 155 pounds, had a very good winter in the States and since his fight with Harper has been training in Halifax with Dick "Kid" Howard who goes against Armand Savoie next week.

Cubs Shade Giants 5-4 In 10 Innings; Indians Whip Boston

Eddie Miksis' first homer of the season in the 10th inning gave Chicago a 5-4 victory over New York Friday and inflicted only the second Giant defeat in 10 games on western trip.

Miksis' game-deciding blast on the first pitch in the 10th by Marv Grissom, fifth Giant pitcher, gave the victory to cub reliever Jim Davis.

The Giants had tied the score at 4-4 in the ninth on Ray Katt's first major league homer with none aboard.

Grissom had hurled from the ninth inning, following starter Jim

Hern, Hoyt Wilhelm, Alex Koni-kowski and John McCall.

Davis, who got his second victory against two losses, entered the game in the 10th—the third cub pitcher after starter Johnny Klippstein and Hal Jeffcoat.

After Randy Jackson tagged Hearn for his 11th home run in the opening inning, and the Giants scored in the second on a walk to Marvin Klippstein's wild pitch and Mueller's single, the score hung tied 1-1 until the three-run cub sixth.

The game at Chicago was the only scheduled day game in the major leagues.

Cape Breton Mourns Death Of Young Ernie MacKinnon

NEW WATERFORD, N.S. (CP)—Ernie MacKinnon, who died last week in the ring so he could buy a "full education" but he wrecked his car and died Friday in a hospital bed.

Cape Breton took the news hard because Ernie had won 19 straight fights—one for each of his years—and looked as though he might win the Maritime welterweight title.

Ernie was on his way home Thursday night when his car swerved off the New Waterford-Sydney highway and smashed itself to junk against a bridge support. He had just finished a shift far below ground in No. 18 colliery at North Victoria.

Tommy (Gun) Spencer, former Maritime welterweight champion and the veteran Ernie hoped one day to succeed, and Ernie's manager, Johnny Nemis, stood by him and watched him die. The nurse said Nemis and Spencer were crying.

INTENSE, STUDIOUS

Ernie MacKinnon was an intense, studious lad who never looked like that top-notch ring-fighter man he was rapidly becoming.

He had polio when he was a child and it left him partly crippled. Ernie couldn't back up in the ring. So he knew when he entered a fight he would have to win by an early knockout and he usually did.

He had been scheduled to fight Tuesday night at Halifax.

Ernie won his diploma from Sydney academy two years ago but he passed up the education he sought in favour of boxing. He sped to the local arena and donned his trunks. Ernie MacKinnon won two fights that night and went on to become a golden gloves champion.

This year, Ernie got a job in the pits because the education he was shooting for cost much more than the days at Sydney academy.
