## Expand Business Course At PWC

An expanded program of night courses in business administration will start today and tomorrow at Prince of Wales College.

The extension course, now in its fourth year, will be primarily for owners and employees of businesses. It will last until next April.

The extension course is reported to have increased in enrolment each year. This year two courses will be offered. One called Business Administration I (management), has been held in previous years. An addition to this year's program is Business Administration II (Accounting).

The courses are designed to help participants to continue their education and prepare themselves for various professional positions in business.

The courses use both the lecture and discussion techniques. Participants will bring their experiences to bear on problems faced by typical Canadian businessmen. It was reported by the director of the program, Mr. J. H. D. MacLennan, that the courses are well received and that the students are making good progress.

## Island Presbyterian Meets in Malpeque

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met recently in the Princeton Church at Malpeque. The meeting was chaired by the newly elected chairman Rev. I. Walls, Cornwall.

Reports were received of the ministerial strength on the island. A welcome was expressed by the chairman to the recently inducted Ministers: Rev. C. C. Lewis, Spring Park; Rev. Grant Walls, Assistant at Trinity Church, Summerside; Rev. Frank Stiles, Cavendish; Rev. Eric Grant, Vernon-Powall; and Rev. Donald Powell, Knox-River.

The Committee on colleges and students presented two young men to the court. Ralph Lewis and Robert Lockhart, after witnessing to the call they have received to the church, were admitted as candidates to the Christian Ministry from this Presbytery.

The court was addressed by Dr. R. C. Chalmers of Pine Hill in the "Ecumenical Movement" and his address he cautioned the members to beware of the problems of First Fear—a fear that is a dialogue with other Church members we should not be equal to the discussion. Secondly, the problem of the seeming progress and well being of the church today. In an affluent society it is easy to believe because all is going well that we are not called to wrestle the difficult and that in time God will make ecumenicity clearer.

Many, Dr. Chalmers felt, saw the church heading for a giant monolithic structure. In answer to this he stressed his belief that we are not able to say where the church is going in the future. The climate has changed. New goals are visible. But only God has the ultimate goal. We are called to venture as did Abraham, Paul, Wesley, Knox, to follow.

He summed up the relation to this ecumenical movement and the individual members of the church here in Prince Edward Island as fourfold: First, in all our searching and striving, we remain Christians and must act accordingly—especially to ward those with whom we may disagree. They are our brothers and for us all our Lord gave Himself. Secondly, we must pray our way through to the will of God. Thirdly, we must study to know our own faith and theology that we may be able to give answer always for the hope that lies within. Fourthly, we must do something where we are to make our Christianity a real oneness with all Christians in Christ.
