

The New Brunswick Exhibition.

On Monday, a party of excursionists, among whom were His Honor Lieut. Governor Haviland, Major Peake, A. D. C., and a fair representation of Island farmers, left Charlottetown to visit the Exhibition of

NEW BRUNSWICK'S PRODUCTIONS AND INDUSTRIES.

The party which, on leaving the city, consisted of fifty persons, increased to seventy-five on leaving Summerside. An enjoyable passage was experienced to Point du Chené, where the steamer arrived at 2.30 p. m. She usually arrives at one o'clock, but the delay on Monday was caused by a full freight of barley, oysters, pork, etc. A goodly number took passage from Shediac, and when connection was made with the Halifax Express at Painswick, there were on both trains over five hundred passengers, which number increased to over seven hundred on arrival at St. John.

The hotel accommodation in St. John on such occasions as a grand Inter-Provincial Exhibition, is by no means inexhaustible. The greatest difficulty was experienced by the excursionists on Monday in securing lodgings, and were it not that hotel keepers exerted themselves in a most commendable manner, many would have been compelled to walk the streets during the night. In some hotels as many as eleven cots were arranged in a single room. Rest, under such circumstances, could not be had cheaply.

The fine weather of Monday changed most disagreeably on Tuesday. A heavy rain fell early in the morning and continued the greater part of the day. We visited the

previous to the opening. They are the grounds known as Barrack Square, situated near the water's edge, between Sydney and Wentworth streets. On the grounds is erected the beautiful exhibition building, Agricultural Hall, the Hall for the Manitoba Exhibit, and numerous sheds, boxes, stalls and pens, for horses, neat stock, sheep and swine. With the exception of the two first named buildings all others are temporary.

THE EXHIBITION OR PRINCIPAL BUILDING is a splendid edifice. It is 185 feet long by 115 feet broad, forming a cross or three wings, each 80 feet in width, the central portion being a span of 44 feet supported by truss girders. It has a clear story with monitor lights over the gallery front. A central dome with glass sides surmounted with centre pavilion, rises to the height of 85 feet above the main floor. There are triple entrances on the west front and over this is located the Art Gallery. The entrance to the main front is gained by a flight of stairs rising seven feet above the grade of the building, and extending along the front of the building a distance of 44 feet. Leading off this are five doorways; three of which open into the main hall, all with circular tops. Over the centre doorway is a balcony 16 feet long and projecting four feet, supported by ornamental trusses. Immediately over that is a circular pediment, with an ornamental circular window rising above the principal cornice. The grand front or facade, is arranged in bays of triplet windows with two stories by pilasters. The space between these two stories of windows, and under the bottom story is finished with sub-pilasters, lattice and panel work, etc. The principal or main cornice is ornamented with heavy brackets, two to each pilaster, with medallions between. The outer section, or portion over the gallery, has a roof extending around the entire building. The centre section rises above the junction of that roof with the other, forming an additional clear story which will be used for lighting and ventilating the centre building as well as to form a prominent feature in the design of the roof. The centre dome has a base of 46 feet square, and rises some 90 feet above the main floor. The first section of the dome is enclosed with glass to the height of 11 feet. The second section of 10 feet is covered with ventilating slats and ornamented with corbels and trusses. Above this is a grand cupola with convex roof and circular windows on four sides, the whole terminating in a flagstaff forty feet high. At intervals along the roof of the main building are ranged flagstaffs to the number of 60. The building, as it now stands, cost over \$10,000, while the others which surround it, cost over \$4,000. They were built by the citizens of St. John, are free of all incumbrances, and were recently handed over to the Provincial Government. They speak volumes for the energy and zeal of the people of St. John.

OPENING CEREMONY.
The ceremony of opening the Exhibition took place on Tuesday afternoon about 3 o'clock. The Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick and suite, accompanied by Lieut. Governor Haviland and suit, the members of the New Brunswick Government and officers of the active militia. The party was received by a guard of honor, and a salute from heavy artillery was fired as they entered the building. The Lieut. Governor of New Brunswick began the proceedings by delivering a lengthy address, in which he spoke of the progress made by New Brunswick during his own life, and of the bright prospects which were ahead of the Province. He was followed by

who referred to the pleasure he experienced on being present on such an occasion. He did not come to make a speech, but to examine the industries on exhibition. He would be recreant in his duty, however, as Governor of Prince Edward Island, if he was afraid to open his mouth. On behalf of the Island which he represented, he thanked the Government for opening the Exhibition to the Maritime Provinces. We may not hold our own, he said—referring to Prince Edward Island—in manufactures, but in agriculture we can, as was evidenced by the manner in which the ex-

hibits at Montreal carried off the prizes. He alluded to the anticipations of Lieut. Governor Wilnot respecting the great future of New Brunswick, and said that, although his Island had not stone or lime wherewith to erect manufactories, they could supply material for them when they were erected, and could raise an abundance of food for export. He touched upon the export of meat from the Island to the mother country, and referred to the recent successful venture of a number of their agriculturists in this respect. He thought that if farmers would apply more science to their farming, and raise their cattle and work their farms on more scientific principles, they might be far more successful in the pursuit of wealth, and the country would also be more benefited by it. He was happy to see that during the past few years farmers were becoming more alive to this fact. It has a great advantage with respect to cattle raising, and particularly in a country like ours where the winters are so long. The old-fashioned stock were not fit for the butcher's knife until they were four or five years of age, but now, thanks to the application of science, and care in breeding, cattle could be brought to market when they were two or three years old. It was not many years ago since on coming to this Province from Prince Edward Island, he was met by a Custom House officer and his baggage searched for smuggled goods. He was happy, however, to see that all this was changed. He also referred to the efforts that were made to arrange a reciprocal treaty between this Province and P. E. Island, and the inseparable difficulties Mr. Tilley encountered in the attempt, which he was finally obliged to abandon. He honestly believed, he said, that the people of Canada were more wealthy under Confederation than before. He would not touch on the N. P., that being a party question, he felt proud to be present on this occasion and view the many articles on exhibition.

Addresses from the Municipal Council and the Mayor and Aldermen of St. John were then read. Three cheers were given for the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, and three more for the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, after which the Exhibition was declared open.
