

COLONIAL PREMIERS.

Arrangements Completed for Their Entertainment in England.

During the Queen's jubilee celebration the colonial premiers are to be magnificently entertained at the Hotel Cecil, in London, which has 1,700 rooms, and the Government has taken 80 for the colonial guests. The premiers have been asked to stay in London for over a month.

Sir George Turner, premier of Victoria, and party, will arrive on the 4th of June.

Sir Hugh Nelson, premier of Queensland, Lady Nelson, three daughters, one son and two members of his staff also arrive on June 4.

Sir John Forrest, premier of Western Australia; Lady Forrest and suite will arrive also on the 4th June.

Sir Edward Braddon, premier of Tasmania, and party arrive on June 9.

The Hon. Henry Escombe, premier of Natal, and party will arrive on June 11.

Sir William White, premier of Newfoundland and party will arrive on June 15.

The Hon. G. H. Reid, premier of New South Wales, and party arrive on June 18th.

Mr. Laurier, premier of the Dominion of Canada, and Sir Gordon Sprigg, prime minister of Cape Colony, have not yet announced the date of their arrival.

Mr. Kensington, premier of South Australia, and Mrs. Kensington have also accepted, but the date of their arrival is not yet known.

The rooms given to these 11 premiers are on the first and second floors looking into the court yard, and are in one block. Special rooms are set apart exclusively for them for smoking and reading on the ground floor, and there is also a visiting room and lounge. The great public parlors are also at their disposal, and the Indian-room, overlooking the Thames opposite Cleopatra's needle, with views of St. Paul's and the houses of parliament.

They will have all the latest telegraphic news, and will be put in communication with the colonial telegraph cables. They may either dine in the public rooms at separate tables, or in their own rooms, in either case, of course, at the charge of the Government. They will be waited upon by servants in state livery, the hotel servants being at the same time also at their disposal. Colonial office officials will charge themselves with arrangements for their entertainment in London. Royal carriages will be provided for them whenever they wish to drive. The hospitality of the city is to be put at their disposal, and they will be made honorary members of the best West End clubs.

HOME FOR INTERMENT.—Malcolm McKinnon, of Rocky Point, left his home for the United States about a year ago. On Saturday his mortal remains were brought home in the Stanley. The interment took place at Highfield yesterday.

THE MAILS.—The foreign mail arrived via Summerside about half-past nine on Saturday night. The outgoing mail was sent by the Stanley to day on account of the accident to the Petrel. There will be no foreign mails to-night.

THE PETREL DAMAGED.—The Petrel had the fans taken off her propeller while making her way into Summerside harbor with the mails on Saturday evening. According to the Guardian correspondent she had no difficulty until she arrived off Sea Cow Head where she encountered heavy broken ice in going through which she met with the accident to her propeller.

APTON.—The new hall to be known as "Apton" under construction at West River, bids fair to be one of the finest public halls on the island. The plans were drawn by Mr. B. C. Chappell, of Charlottetown, and the building is under the supervision of Mr. Hugh McPhee, of Fair View, which in itself is a guarantee that the work will be executed in a most excellent and efficient manner.

USED THE CHURCH FUNDS.—The Halifax Citizen says that Fred G. Morris, a grocer who has been senior warden of St. George's church, has been obliged to retire from the position. He had the handling of the church funds and used \$2,000 in his business. When an account was demanded he was unable to pay the money. A settlement has been made, Morris executing a second mortgage of \$500 on his house, and giving notes for the remainder of the amount due.

WILL NEVER SMOKE AGAIN.—Living on the Little Buctouche River is a middle-aged gentleman named Ward, who took pleasure in informing every one that he was a grit because of the increase in the tobacco duties made by Mr. Foster three or four years ago, and that he had then thrown away his pipe and declared he'd never smoke again until the grits got in and reduced the duty. If Mr. Ward has not broken his pledge ere this, it is not likely that he ever will, as Mr. Fielding's tariff will add about ten cents per pound to the price of tobacco.—Moncton Times.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—The closing meeting of this institution was held on Saturday evening, and the proceedings were of a very interesting character. It was decided, with a view to enlarging the scope of the institution, that the name be changed to "The Educational Association" of Charlottetown. A committee of seven, consisting of Messrs. The officers-elect for the ensuing year are E. S. Stewart, President, and Ira Yeo, Secretary. The executive committee will consist of the organization committee. A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring president, secretary and Executive Committee for the able, efficient and highly satisfactory manner in which they carried on the work of the Institute during the past year.

MILITARY NIGHT at the Opera House tomorrow night. Dress rehearsal at 8 o'clock.

HAMS STOLEN.—Two hams were last night stolen from the warehouse of Hugh Monaghan, Grafton Street West.

POSTPONED.—The Y. M. C. A. Gymnastic Exhibition and Concert, to have been given tonight, will be held on Friday, 30th inst.

TO LOAD OATS.—The steamer Nord is daily expected from Halifax. She will be loaded with oats for the English market by Carvell Bros.

THE PRINCESS left here for Picton about eleven o'clock this forenoon and returned to port shortly after twelve. She only got out a short distance past the Block House Light. A good deal of ice is reported outside.

POLICE COURT.—Four Scott Act cases were disposed of at the police court this morning. Ann Quinn was fined \$50 and \$6.90 costs or two months' imprisonment. The summonses against Alfred J. Quirk and James Haynes were dismissed. Thos. Meek's case was adjourned.

THE STANLEY left here for Picton at seven o'clock this morning. There is a good deal of ice outside the harbor and she had considerable difficulty getting through. At noon she was reported off Flat River, clear of ice. At the rate she was moving it was thought that she would reach Picton in time to connect with the two o'clock train. She will leave Picton for Charlottetown tomorrow morning, bringing the mails.

ODDFELLOWSHIP.—The Oddfellows attended Divine service in St. Paul's Church yesterday morning. Rev. J. T. Bryan, the rector, preached a very practical and appropriate sermon from the text, "Bear ye one another's burdens." The procession, which was headed by the Citizen's Band, was the largest we have seen in this city for some time, and shows that the I. O. O. F. is still on the increase. In connection with the Natal Day celebration a social will be held in Oddfellows Hall this evening, one portion of the programme being the presentation of a Veteran Oddfellow's jewel to Bro. D. R. McLennan, who has completed his twenty-five years of continuous membership of the Order.

INTERESTING NEWS NOTES SELECTED FOR THE EXAMINER.

Diphtheria is prevalent in Moncton. Springfield, Ohio, has a curfew law. The ordinance requires all boys and girls under sixteen years of age to be in bed by eight o'clock in winter and nine o'clock in summer.

The Guatemala constitutional assembly has approved a bill authorizing the president to raise a loan of two million dollars to complete the Southern Railway.

Norwood, Ont., suffered a severe loss by fire recently. All the business places in the town were practically wiped out of existence. The insurance will only amount to about \$40,000. The place had no fire protection.

An attempt was recently made to assassinate the President of Uruguay, Senor J. Idiarte Borda. He was shot at by the would-be assassin, but the bullet missed its mark. The president's assailant has been arrested.

As a result of a bloody battle between two convicts in San Quentin, Cal., prison one is dead and the other dying. Each had a knife and they had been busily engaged carving each other for some time before the guards could interfere.

A Rossland, B. C., despatch says that as a result of a landslides near Sheep Creek on the Red Mountain Railroad, six men were killed and a number of others seriously injured. The men were employed on the railroad. The number of injured is not known.

In the central business portion of the city of St. Louis, on Friday last, Edward Clayland, a lineman for the Missouri electric light and power company was burned to death by a live wire. His smoking body hung in the air for at least ten minutes in view of the thousands.

J. E. Kelly, arrested for the murder of the cashier of the Somersworth Bank, has made a full confession of his guilt. Kelly was arrested in Annie Ashton's dive, at Montreal, disguised as a female. It is said that a plea of insanity will be entered in Kelly's behalf, he having received an injury to his head when he was a child.

Word comes from Philadelphia that the 350 frame houses, built by the Carnegie firm within the enclosure of the mill at Homestead, were destroyed by fire one day last week. The houses were built during the great Homestead strike in 1892 for the protection of their workmen against the strikers. Twelve hundred people will be homeless.

It is stated that the Southern Pacific company is making arrangements to build a bridge to cost \$5,000,000 across the Mississippi river at New Orleans. This bridge will do away with the transfer by boat of freight and passengers across the Mississippi. It will have double tracks and will cross the river about five miles above New Orleans.

Billy Vernon, the Haverstraw, N. Y., pugilist, and Leslie Pearce met in the ring at Athens, Delaware, one night last week. Vernon collapsed in the fourteenth round, and was taken to a hospital in an unconscious condition. He remained unconscious until death came. Pearce is under arrest.

The Dean of Canterbury is going to publish, through Messrs. Longman, a volume which he has long had in preparation on "The Bible: its Meaning and Supremacy." The Athenaeum states that the Dean discards the theory of verbal inspiration, and points out that the Bible is not a homogeneous book, but a canon gradually formed.
