

# Ch'town Rink Lopes Bonspiel

**Announce New  
Racing Stakes**

YONKERS, N.Y. (AP) — Two new stakes, the richest in harness racing history for two-year-olds, were announced Wednesday by Yonkers Raceway for the 1958 season, which opens Aug. 1.

They are the \$100,000-added Empire Pace and the \$50,000-added Billtop Trot, each a one-mile dash expected to have a prize value of more than \$80,000.

Nominations for each close Jan. 1, 1958, at a fee of \$25, with additional eligibility payments April 15, and a starting fee of \$2,000. Dates of the races will be announced later.

# Brown Defeats Joey Lopes

CHICAGO (AP) — Joe Brown cut loose with a violent fury in the 11th round to stop challenger Joey Lopes on a technical knock-out in the third defence of his world lightweight title Wednesday night at Chicago Stadium.

Brown, who had dropped Lopes in the seventh, smashed Lopes to the floor twice in the 11th and was raising heavy punishment on his dazed, helpless opponent when referee Joey White called a halt.

Two of the officials had Brown out in front at the end of 10 rounds and referee White had scored it all even 45-45 up to that point.

But it appeared that it was only a matter of time before Brown's heavy punches would wear down his light-hitting opponent from Sacramento, Calif. Lopes carried the battle to the champion during most of the

scrap but he didn't carry the heavy guns. Brown waited for sharp counterpunches to take the fight back and away.

The challenger, who won the same as the champ from New Orleans at 123½ pounds, was bleeding from cuts around both eyes and inside the mouth.

Normally it takes Brown several rounds to warm up. This was the case Wednesday night, although he piled up points in the early rounds on his left jab.

The first definite indication that the end could not be far off came in the seventh when Brown shook up Lopes with his first real combination of the night. The champion landed a bristling right to the point of the chin and Lopes hit the deck. Although corner crew shouted to Lopes to take more time, he bounced up at the count of four.

**Fight - Fixing  
Case Dismissed**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Welterweight boxer Art (Golden Boy) Aragon was freed of fixing fight charges Wednesday.

The case was dismissed by Judge Herbert V. Walker on the recommendation of district attorney William McKesson. The prosecutor said he doubted whether a trial would be justified because of the expense and the fact witnesses have scattered.

Last Oct. 25 the district court of appeal reversed Aragon's conviction and ordered a new trial, holding that Judge Walker's instructions to the jury were prejudicial to Aragon.

Aragon, 29, was convicted last February and sentenced to one to five years in prison on a charge of offering waterweight Dick Golden \$500 to fake a fourth-round knockout in a bout scheduled for last Dec. 18 in San Antonio, Tex. The fight was not

# Hawks Shutout Rangers; Leafs Canadiens Tie 0-0

NEW YORK (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks stopped a three-game losing streak Wednesday night by defeating New York Rangers 2-0 in goals by Elmer Vaska and Ed Litzenberger in a National Hockey League game at Madison Square Garden.

The shutout was the fifth of the season for Glenn Hall. He turned back 22 Ranger shots.

Vaska touched off the scoring 45 seconds after opening face off. It was his second goal of the season.

Litzenberger's tally, his 11th of the campaign, came at 1:09 of the final period. He fired a low 20-footer into the cage. Ted Lindsay and Eric Nesterenko recorded assists.

The Nesterenko line has accounted for 21 of Chicago's 44 goals this year. The result was a disappointment to most of the crowd of 7,618, which braved a driving snowstorm to witness Chicago's second successive win against the Rangers in six starts this season.

The Hawks' victory increased their point total to 20, one more than idle Detroit.
