The steamer "Miramichi" arrived from Montreal this forenoon with a large cargo of merchandise.

It is reported that two Quebec merchants have realized \$30,000 profit on sugar sold in England last week.

EDWARD BAYFIELD, Esq., and Mrs. Bayfield, returned from a two months' visit to England on Saturday evening.

JAMES ANTHONY FROUDE is preparing a paper on Romanism and the Irish race in America, to appear in the December number of the *North American Review*.

FIFTEEN Students are in attendance at the present session at the Halifax Theological Hall. Charles D. McLaren, of Souris, and A. B. McLeod, are in attendance.

DIPLOMATIC action has brought about a more satisfactory understanding between England and Turkey, and the British fleet is not to be sent to Constantinople.

MR. ALEXANDER STRONACH, Mechanical Superintendent of the Railway, has gone to Kingston, Ont., to look after the construction of two locomotives which are to be made there for the P. E. Island Railway.

NEARLY all the vessels which arrived in New York during the past week experienced a violent cyclone at sea on the date of the late gale which did so much damage in the Maritime Provinces.

THE Methodist Relief Movement has been very successful in Moncton, \$9,985 having been already subscribed towards the fund, although but \$4,000 was thought to be a sanguine estimate of what would be raised.

A P. E. ISLAND PEDESTRIAN IN BOSTON.—The *Boston Globe* of Thursday contains a challenge from M. J. Happany (of this Island) offering to run Thos. Donohoe, of Lowell, a race of five miles for \$250 a side.

ON SATURDAY night the brig *Peerless*, owned and sailed by Capt. Douse, ran ashore on the north side of Brickmaker's Point. She was towed off at high tide last night without damage. She is loaded with coal from Sydney.

MR. THOMAS VINNICOMBE, a brother of Mr. H. W. Vinnicombe, of this city, has been serving with the British army in Zululand, and has, we understand, been decorated with the highest medal that can be obtained for valor and distinguished services in the field.—*Patriot*.
