

Grave Concern Expressed Over Seaway Winter Plan

OTTAWA (CP)—Liberal G. Roy McWilliam said Monday operation of the St. Lawrence Seaway on a year-round basis will seriously affect the economy of the Atlantic provinces.

Speaking in the Commons throne speech debate, the Member for Northumberland-Miramichi said "grave concern" is being expressed in the Atlantic provinces over any plan to keep the St. Lawrence River open in the winter.

"I join with individuals and groups in protesting against action that will adversely affect our Maritime winter ports," he said. "If Canada is to survive as a nation of distributed wealth a plan of 'live and let live' must be followed."

Mr. McWilliam touched on a number of other subjects.

He said the publicly-owned CBC should take immediate steps to provide television service to northeastern New Brunswick; The area now was served by private stations in Moncton and Saint John. However, reception was unsatisfactory because the two stations were 100 miles or more away from communities in northeastern New Brunswick.

The CBC should establish a satellite station on high ground at the boundary line between Northumberland and Gloucester Counties. The satellite station could be hooked up with the CBC system serving western areas of the province.

Mr. McWilliam protested that the Queen would not visit his

constituency during her Canadian visit next summer. He had hoped the tour would include a motor trip from Fredericton to Newcastle and Chatham or a flight from the New Brunswick capital to the RCAF station at Chatham.

He asked the government for reports on the proposed causeway between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and the proposed Chignecto Canal to separate New Brunswick and Nova Scotia between the Northumberland Strait and the Bay of Fundy.

Referring to the Maritime fishing industry, he said the government should act to regain lost markets and obtain new ones. This was the only way the east coast fishing industry could survive.

INDIANS PROTEST INCOME TAX BILL

MASSENA, N.Y. (AP)—Nearly 200 Indians from the St. Regis reservation demonstrated Monday against payment of state income taxes and threatened to use violence to light the fires in our longhouses.

Under the direction of Mad Bear Anderson of the allied Tuscarora nation, a small group walked to the front of the town hall auditorium and ripped notices into pieces.

The Indians at St. Regis had refused to pay state income tax because of the terms of century-old treaties, but last September a court ruled that Indians were subject to state income tax payments.

"The United States is in for a reckoning in its treatment of Indians," Anderson told the group. He called the elected chiefs of the tribe "traitors" because they had urged tribe members to abide with the court decision.

Bishops' Acclamation Follows Papal Action

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The first acclamation of Roman Catholic bishops was received Monday for the ecumenical council called by Pope John—a meeting that may prove to be Christianity's most immense gathering.

The 77-year-old, supreme ruler of the Roman Catholic Church announced the ecumenical world-wide meeting Sunday. Its primary objective, announced by a brief Vatican press office communique, is to be unity of Christian churches.

The news was received with mixed feelings in various parts of the world by Protestant, Chris-

tian orthodox and other religious communities separated from the Roman Church.

DATE NOT SET
The date for the council has not been set. Speculation in Vatican circles about when it might be held range all the way from late this year to as much as two years from now.

The last ecumenical council began in 1869 and was never officially ended. Four years were required for its preparation. It came to a halt when Italian troops occupied Rome to unite Italy. More than 800 cardinal archbishops and bishops attended it.

Prelates of the church eligible to attend the new council, including all resident bishops, today total about 3,500. But it is not probable that all of them will attend.

The new council will be the 21st in the history of the church. It is likely, Vatican sources said Monday, that it will be held either in St. Peter's Basilica or in the Basilica of St. John Lateran, the Pope's See as Bishop of Rome.

Some Vatican sources said that preparations for the council might have been started some time ago by the late Pope Pius XII.

IN FIRST MESSAGE
The subject of Christian unity, however, is one that his successor, John XXIII, mentioned in his first message as Pope—the day after he was elected. On Oct. 29, speaking in Latin, the new Pope said:

"And as we do the western church we embrace with equal paternal affection the Oriental church; and open our heart and arms to all those who are separated from this Apostolic See, where Peter himself lives in his successor."

Vatican sources said that almost certainly leaders of Christian religious other than Roman Catholic would be invited to attend the council, at least as observers.

In London, Canon Christopher Douglas Waddams, secretary of the Church of England council for foreign affairs, said guardedly that if there really should be an acceptable invitation offering "a constructive move towards co-operation between the Roman Catholic Church and other Christian churches, it would surely be welcomed."

Russia Agrees To Limit Tin Exports In '59

LONDON (AP)—The international Tin Council today said Russia has agreed to limit tin exports outside the Iron Curtain to 13,500 tons in 1959.

"The Soviet Union is not a member of the International Tin Agreement and accordingly is not obliged to take any commitments in respect of trade in tin," said a tin council communique.

"Nevertheless the Soviet Union has moved toward the desires of the exporting and importing countries members of the council and has confirmed her intention to reduce her tin exports outside the socialist countries in 1959 as compared with the exports in 1958."

GRAIN CARGOES SHOW INCREASE

WENNIPEG (CP) — A total of 1,123 cargoes of grain and screenings moved out of the Canadian Lakehead during the 1958 navigation season compared with 1,072 in the previous season, the board of grain commissioners reported Monday. The record year for total cargoes was 1945 when 2,101 cargoes moved.
