 Money to Loan
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Liquor Problem Stressed At Presbytery Meeting At Borden

A largely representative meeting of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada, held at Borden on Wednesday, was informed that liquor consumption on the island increased to over 2 1/4 million dollars during the year 1951. Great concern was shown about this fact especially because of its implication of accompanying material, moral, and physical waste and destruction. This proved to be one of the highlights of the reports and discussions of the day.

Mr. W. E. Brooks, continuing the report of the Laymen's Association, stressed the need for more intensive evangelism that will get to the roots of this and other moral and spiritual problems. The same strong note of evangelism was stressed later in the day in the report of the committee of evangelism and social service. This included the need for a competent evangelist for the Maritime Conference area, the importance of preaching missions conducted by special evangelists.

The Presbytery was pleased to hear a short talk from Dr. Ross C. Eaton, Field Secretary of the Maritime Temperance Federation, who is doing work among the schools, churches, and social clubs on the island during the month of May.

The nominating committee brought in the new slate of officers including—Chairman, Rev. D. W. MacPherson, Murray Harbour. Secretary, Rev. W. B. Crowe, Bedeque (re-elected), and treasurer, Rev. W. B. F. Corkum, Souris.

Mr. Richard Creed and Rev. Dr. W. MacPherson were nominated as commissioners to the General Council which meets in Ontario this year.

The Committee on Christian Education stressed the value of boys' and girls' camps and of church vacation schools. They urged the members of the Presbytery to take an active interest in these opportunities for Christian training.

Two young men from this Presbytery were recommended for ordination to the Christian ministry—David Barwise, Charlottetown and Clifford Moore, Kensington.

The committee on pastoral relations reported the following ministers are moving from this Presbytery: Rev. S. Leonard Bacon, John Douglas, Leonard Woolfrey, R. A. Baxter and H. E. D. Ashford. Coming to the Presbytery are Rev. S. W. N. Byers and W. H. Forsythe.

The committee on the Missionary and Maintenance Fund reported that more charges had forwarded donations to Toronto by March 31 this year than at the same time last year. They urged

S'side Traffic Safety Committee Holds Meeting

At the last regular meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade a new committee was formed to be known as "traffic safety committee" under the chairmanship of Mr. Lester Jenkins.

This committee held its first meeting last evening and tentative plans were drawn up which will be submitted to Hon. Walter E. Darby, Attorney General for his consideration.

The committee proposes to put into operation a campaign to make the month of June "Traffic Safety Month." Realizing the necessity of bringing forcibly home to the drivers of all motor vehicles the necessity of protection for the children and on the other hand to impress on parents the necessity of instruction in the home for children from the time they are first able to walk, this committee has drawn up a list of do's and don'ts for drivers, for children themselves and also for the parents.

The full cooperation of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Summerside Police will be asked. They will be requested to give lectures to the younger children on traffic safety as well as to the older ones who drive cars. School officials, clergymen, and sundry school teachers and theatre owners will be requested to help put over the message of protection for the children of the town.—S
