\$20 Fines Are Levied

GEORGETOWN — Magistrate's court was held in Georgetown yesterday with Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, presiding. The crown was represented by Kings County crown prosecutor, Gordon Tweedy.

Everett Richard Gormley of St. Mary's Road pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 and costs on a charge of causing a disturbance near the Beaver Club in Montague by fighting.

Wayne James Lannigan of Montague failed to appear in court and the charge against him of causing a disturbance in Montague by fighting and swearing in his absence. Giving evidence for the crown were RCMP Constable Reginald Lutes and William A. Doucette. Lannigan was fined \$20 and costs.

Harry A. MacSwain of Murray River was fined \$30 and costs for causing a disturbance in the main street in Murray River by shouting and swearing.

Archie Llewellyn of Campbellville, Ontario, was fined \$100 and costs for having the care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired.

Harry Linden Stewart pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 and costs for impaired driving. Albert Joseph MacPhee of Georgetown and Nelson Warren Buell of Abney, both charged with impaired driving had their cases adjourned and were further remanded on bond to appear on September 1st.

John William Rume of Kinross, charged with driving without due care and attention, and represented by Bert Campbell, had his case adjourned to September 1 to fix a date for trial.

Edgar J. Boudreau of Georgetown who pleaded not guilty in traffic court to failing to stop at a stop sign, was fined \$5 and costs following the evidence of Georgetown Police-Constable, George Jackson. The accused did not call witnesses nor give evidence himself.

A considerable number of cases under the Liquor Control Act were before the magistrate at yesterday's sitting.

Methodists Hold Meeting

LONDON (AP)—The World Methodist Conference was held Thursday by a German businessman that methodism must remain a revivalist movement or die.

Speaking to the 11th world conference, Rudolf Schiele said that what is needed is more than the present "small proportion called to the discipleship of the religion."

"There are hundreds of millions of Christians but only a small proportion is called to the discipleship in the sense that it was demonstrated in the beginning. It is my daily distress that we have to seek Sunday school teachers, youth leaders and active workers in the lay service."

Profiteering Given Blame

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — New Democratic Party leader T. C. Douglas says "greedy profiteering" must stop in Canada or the country will be the "constant scene of disputes and turmoil."

Mr. Douglas told the annual convention of the Newfoundland Labor Federation Wednesday that "propagandists of big business" blamed the rising cost of living on unionists.

He said corporation profits increased 44 per cent in Canada from 1960 to 1964 and wage increases have failed to keep up with this.

Kings Board Of Trade Elects New Executive

SOURIS — Joseph Gallant, Russell Ching, W. M. MacLean, Hugh MacKinnon, Major Reid, Melvin LeBreche, Wesley Fraser were elected members of the executive of the Eastern Kings Board of Trade at the annual meeting yesterday.

A business session was held in the afternoon, followed by a dinner at the Lord Rollo Motel. They will meet later to elect a president and other officers. Joseph Gallant was president of the board last year.

During the meeting regret was expressed at the forthcoming departure of the secretary, Rev. Malcolm Smith, minister of the Church of Christ at South Lake. He is leaving the province for the United States.

Guest speaker at the dinner was Cyril Leard of Alberton, president of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade.

Other speakers included Senator T. J. Kichham, Bruce Stewart, M.L.A., Melvin McQuaid, M.P. Hon. Daniel MacDonald, minister of agriculture, A. T. Parks, Moncton, general secretary Maritime Provinces Board of Trade, and C. W. Moffatt, general manager Charlottetown Board of Trade.

Donald discussed the proposed second national park for the Province, located in eastern Kings County. He dealt with steps in the acquiring of land for the development.

At the business meeting the board asked in resolutions for an all-weather road to Souris, paving of the road from Poole's Corner directly to link up with the paved road out of Charlottetown and proposed an increase in ferry rates.

The board also made a bid for a ferry service from Kings County to Nova Scotia. It would link the new National Park in Kings with the Cabot Trail and the Highlands National Park in Cape Breton and be an asset to the tourist industry.

Medical Ass'n President Addresses Conference

Dr. R.K.C. Thomson of Edmonton, Alberta, president of the Canadian Medical Association, was the guest speaker at a luncheon yesterday at the close of the morning session of the P.E.I. Medical Society's annual meeting.

The meeting got underway yesterday morning at Montgomery Hall, chaired by Dr. C.A. Chady, president of the P.E.I. Society.

A luncheon was held at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, chaired by Dr. Kent Irwin of Charlottetown.

Dr. Thomson based his talk on the theme "Canadian Medical Manpower."

OPENS REMARKS

The speaker opened his remarks by saying, "It has long been conceded that the export of brains from the Maritimes has been a source of great comfort to other parts of Canada indeed to many parts of the world, but I am sure that you will agree with me that robbing Peter to pay Paul produces no lasting benefit. The simple reshuffling of available medical manpower to Canada will not be any solution to our problem of providing comprehensive medical care to all Canadians," he stated.

Dr. Thomson went on to say that "The quality of medical care provided to all Canadians ranks with the highest in the world but the doctors providing this care vary in number, source and kind. Our concern must be not only with maintaining this high standard of care, but also with ensuring that the numbers and training of the medical manpower of the future will meet the needs of a changing world."

"It has been said that the doctors should concern themselves with the quality of medical care and reduce their concern for sources of types of payment and provision of facilities.

This is not possible. The very production of high quality medical care is influenced by many factors but chiefly the supply of medical manpower; the tremendous increase in knowledge in the health field; our ability to pass this knowledge along through training at undergraduate levels; the increasing demand for services and the increasing interest in the health fields on the part of governments — both provincial and federal," he pointed out.

IMPROVING RATIO

Dr. Thomson told the meeting that the Canadian Medical Association published a study on Canadian Medical Manpower in 1951 and 1955 and that these studies indicate that there has been a steadily improving doctor population ratio. He added that this indicates that presently we have been spared a serious shortage of medical manpower because Canada has proved to be an attractive place to many physicians who have received their training in other parts of the world.

These are generally long-range studies but if they are properly carried out they will give us reliable information which we can use in outlining our manpower needs for the future.
