

HOUSE DEBATES STOP-GAP FUNDS

Now Law Urges Government To Seek Balanced Budget

OTTAWA (CP) — The government was advised Friday to work toward a balanced budget or face difficulty in borrowing United States money, plus pressure on the dollar.

Former Finance Minister George Nowlan, advised Liberal Finance Minister Walter Gordon that extravagant expenditures and excessive borrowing can do damage to the Canadian economy.

It was necessary to narrow the existing gap between borrowing rates in Canada and the U.S.—a spread that Mr. Nowlan called liberal but not substantial.

He spoke as the Commons was asked to approve the provision of \$1,400,000,000 to cover expenditures made in April and May—plus those anticipated for June and July. The April-May spending was done by government's warrants for the period while Parliament was dissolved.

Two Charged With Robbery At Stellarton

STELLARTON, N.S. (CP) — Two men picked up by police in Moncton Friday were charged here with robbery with violence.

Richard A. Smith, 27, of Sarnia, Ont., and John Harry MacLeod, 19, of Eureka, N.S., were remanded for trial June 6.

The two were apprehended following a grocery store robbery here Thursday afternoon when two men changed their key Victor Stallman, union leader with a telephone and robbed him of more than \$500.

Mr. Stallman was reported in satisfactory condition in a New Glasgow hospital Friday.

Island-Born Mayor Says Raffle Miss Whitton

TORONTO (CP) — A suggestion that Mayor Charlotte Whitton of Ottawa be offered as a raffle prize was made at the annual conference of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities Friday.

Mayor Lloyd Henderson of Portage la Prairie, Man., who was referred to as a "prairie gopher" earlier this week by Mayor Whitton, made the suggestion in discussion of a resolution that the federation advocate eating of the criminal code to allow charitable groups to sell bingo and raffles to raise money.

(Mayor Henderson is a native of Prince Edward Island.)

The resolution was accepted after spirited debate by a vote of 99 to 10.

Eric Teed, mayor of Sarnia, Ont., said the resolution was "a disgrace to the federation."

"The question of bingo and raffles is not worthy of discussion for its consequences. Surely there are more important topics."

Mayor George O'Reilly of Verdun, Que., said he was in favor of the resolution. Legislation is needed to keep Canadian money from going to foreign interests like the Irish Sweepstakes.

Portage la Prairie Mayor Henderson rejected the resolution because "it has to be in a hospital financing by lotteries with my health dependent upon the gambling spirit of the nation."

"Anyway," he said, "only two per cent of lottery investment gets back to hospitals."

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The debate was still going on when the adjournment hour was reached. The proposal thus did not pass and debate on it continued on Monday.

Mr. Gordon, speaking briefly, said the government's application for funds would include an offer to borrow \$1,500,000,000 for public works and general purposes if necessary. Another money supply bill will be introduced in July, he said.

Abegweit Returns To Service Today

The CNR despatcher at Charlottetown last evening reported the ferry MV Abegweit sailed from the shipyard in Halifax for Borden at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

No word had been received from the ship as to her exact time of arrival, but she is expected to be in Borden about midday today.

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Justice Spence Goes To Supreme Court Of Canada

OTTAWA (CP) — Appointment of Mr. Justice W. F. Spence of the Supreme Court of Ontario as a judge of the Supreme Court of Canada was announced Friday by Justice Minister Lionel Chevrier.

He fills the sole vacancy on the nine-member court, highest in the land. The vacancy was created by the death in February of Chief Justice Patrick Kerwin. Last month the new Liberal government promoted Mr. Justice Spence as a judge of the Supreme Court of Ontario.
