

Former Islander Retiring From Manhattan Bank

The retirement of a distinguished former Islander, Mr. E. B. Macdonald, for twenty-three years vice-president of the Manhattan Company Bank, is referred to in Manhattan newspapers of recent date. Mr. Macdonald is a brother of Mrs. W. D. Gillis, Charlottetown. The following account of his career is observed: "Mr. Macdonald came to Jamaica in 1914 from the Bank of Nova Scotia to join the staff of the Bank of Long Island. When that bank was merged with the Bank of the Manhattan Company in 1920 Mr. Macdonald was made an auditor and later an officer. With the late P. A. Rowley he was largely instrumental in developing the bank's business in Queens and Brooklyn, opening a number of branches. "Throughout the years Mr. Macdonald has taken a keen interest in banking, industrial and social service activities. Besides being vice-president of his bank he is chairman of the Manhattan Company, director of the Bank of Manhattan Security Deposit Company; director, George A. Krug Baking Company; director, Empire Millwork Corporation; director and treasurer, Chamber of Commerce of the Borough of Queens; director, Queensborough Society for Children; director, Crucifix Welfare Society of Queens; director, Community Service Society of New York, Queens; trustee, Citizens Budget Commission; chairman, New York State Savings Bond Committee, Queens; honorary chairman, Queens Campaign Executive Committee, Great Neck, N.Y.; fund; council member, large and member of finance committee, Boy Scouts Foundation, Queens; sustaining member, Queens Speech and Hearing Service Center; charter and life member, Bowne House Historical Society, Flushing. "He is a member of the Union League Club, Seawane Harbor Club, Lawrence Beach Club, Jamaica Club, K. of C. Maris Stella Council, American Legion, John W. Mark Post, Salvation Army, B.P.O. Elks No. 878, Canadian Society of New York, Queens County Bankers Association. "To a representative of the Leader-Observer, Mr. Macdonald said he intended to retire to a quiet cove on Long Island and take life easy." He will, however, continue his interest in some of the organizations in which he is a director and also his social service work. "Mr. Macdonald was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, he attended Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University, Canada. He resides at 1050 Park Avenue, Manhattan."

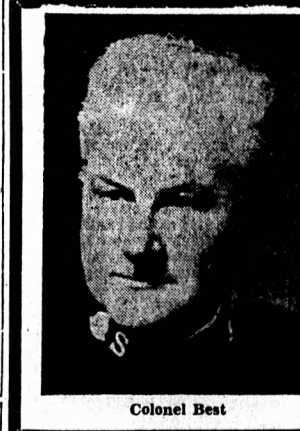
PERSONAL
