McKenzie's policy is killing off our inter-provincial trade, and thereby sowing seeds which will cause the disruption of the union, besides depriving our farmers and millers of their most profitable market.

McKenzie's policy is driving our trade away from the Motherland and into the arms of the United States.

McKenzie's policy has ruined our West India trade, and thereby deprived our farmers of their most profitable foreign market.

MEN OF CANADA, do you wish to see your country, despite all her magnificent resources, sink to the degrading level of the commercial vassal, the hewer of wood, and the drawer of water for the neighboring Republic? If so, support the opponents of the National Policy.

The Grit Platform.

THE "Free Trade" (save the mark) meeting in the Athenaeum, last night, was a great fizzle. From a hundred and fifty to two hundred persons were present—with a large sprinkling of Grit officials, who bore external marks of anxiety for their coming "slide." Messrs. Welsh, Davies, L. H. Davies and P. Connolly, livery stable keeper, addressed the meeting. In the opinion of the Patriot, the latter gentleman delivered the best address. It quotes one of his most beautiful passages, and ignores those of Welsh and the Davies. At the close three cheers were proposed for Pope and Brecken, and they were responded to by a large number of those present.

Great Storm in the Upper Provinces.

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—Reports of the storm hereabouts detail great damage and loss of life. The water at Port Dalhousie is running on the top of the lock, level with the embankment above the lock, and with the dam at the new lock. Great fears are entertained that it will yet break through both the embankments and the dam. No vessels have been locked through since yesterday. The harbor is full of them. If the water overflows the embankment, it will cause great damage to all the vessels. The wind is southwest, blowing a gale, with the water still rising. A storm is raging at Brampton, when it commenced raining on Thursday evening and continued until last evening, when it increased to a heavy rainfall, which kept on until noon to-day, causing the worst flood ever known, nearly all the water being a foot deep in most of the stores on Main street. Teams were despatched about four miles distant for boats with which to rescue families living in the lower part of the town. The cries of women and children in some of the tenements was pitiful to hear while waiting for help. All are now safe. It is impossible to estimate the damage done. Trains are interrupted on all the railways to the west. Several deaths by running off tracks are reported, also by drowning. Telegraphic communication has been re-opened with the west.
