Plan P.E.I. Blood Clinics In Dec.

Prince Edward Islanders will have a chance to replenish the badly over-drawn Blood Bank which is some 600 bottles short on this year's operation to date, when clinics are to be held at the following centres during the week of December 5th: R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, St. Peter's Bay, Souris and Charlottetown. This unprecedented shortage has been caused by the poor attendance at the clinics held in this province in early September, and by the unusually large demand for blood in the first ten months of 1954.

2,090 donors registered at the clinics held here in June and September, but in the ten months just completed, 2,335 bottles of whole blood, plus 102 bottles of plasma, have been used for patients in all the hospitals in this province. Since three bottles of blood are required to make one bottle of plasma this means that 2,941 bottles have been used as against 2,090 collected.

Active committees in the above mentioned centres are seriously concerned with this shortage and determined to exceed the objectives set for their December clinics so that this deficit may be overcome and a credit established for the succeeding months.

Famous Polio Victim Dies After 18 Years

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Fred B. Smit, Jr., infantile paralysis victim who lived 18 years and seven months in an iron lung, died Friday while here to participate in the Florida state bridge tournament.

Smit, accompanied by his wife and two medical aides, came here Thursday from his Miami Beach home for the first round of bridge. He did not show up for Friday's round, and was found dead in his hotel room.

Apparently he had been taking a nap and died quietly in his sleep, still encased in the respirator which kept him alive through the years. The machine was working normally.

There was no official announcement of the cause of death, but friends said "a brave heart grew too tired from the strain."

His body was being returned to Miami Beach.

STRUCKEN AT 26 — Smit, now 44 was stricken with complete paralysis at Peiping, China, in April, 1936, a few weeks before his 26th birthday. He lay at death's door in a Chinese hospital for months, then was taken to his home in Chicago in an iron lung.

Since then he has been married and became the father of eight children. His fortitude and good nature became an inspiration to thousands and his fame became worldwide.

Lying flat on his back in the cylindrical "iron lung," he had travelled many thousands of miles, including a journey to the Shrine of our Lady of Lourdes in France where he prayed for a return to active life.

SHORT RESPIRE — The prayers were only partially answered, and then by the development of a lightweight "lung" which permitted him to sit up a few hours at a time. He could actually leave the artificial respirator for short periods.

Despite his great handicap, Smit tried valiantly to live a normal life. He attended sports events in his power-equipped van, and was a regular contestant in bridge tournaments in the area.

His condition was reported improved and satisfactory. Bellefleur was arrested Thursday after reports that his wife had been badly beaten. Wearing pajamas and bleeding profusely, she walked out of her home and was taken to hospital.

A three-act play, "The White Headed Boy," is under rehearsal by the Little Theatre Guild with a view to early productions as is also the three-act play "Antigone," by St. Dunstan's University.

Miss Jeanne Fraser, secretary, read correspondence which was dealt with, and conveners of committees reported on their activities. After some discussion concerning royalties, it was agreed that the association pay a larger royalty fee for three-act plays.

Attention was drawn to the fact that all holders of membership cards will be admitted to two performances free of charge.

Hurricanes Cost Lloyds 112 Million

LONDON (AP) — Carol, Dolly, Edna and Hazel sent the bill for their tragic sprees to Lloyds' and it came to \$112,000,000.

The four are the code names for hurricanes which roared out of the Caribbean this year and paths of devastation there and in the United States and Canada.

Underwriters at Lloyds', the famous insurance firm, said Friday they expect to pay out every few years on one hurricane, but that four in one season makes a heavy burden.

Carol, Dolly, Edna and Hazel are estimated to have killed more than 300 people and caused damage of \$135,000,000. The \$112,000,000 represents the amount it will cost Lloyds' underwriters.

Insurance experts said it was difficult to determine how much of the total loss was insured with American, Canadian and British insurance companies. However, Dolly produced 200,000 claims in the New York and New England areas alone, the highest ever known for one hurricane.

Minister Admits Hunting Accident

BLAIRSVILLE, Ga. (AP) — A Baptist minister admitted that while on a hunting trip six days ago he accidentally fired a shot which killed a companion at whose funeral he later preached.

L. Woody Wilson of the Georgia bureau of investigation said the Rev. C. Brewer, 46-year-old pastor of four rural churches, admitted the accident in a statement issued through his counsel. Wilson said that following a coroner's inquest held Friday Brewer was charged with murder and placed in jail.

The victim was identified as Alvin Towle, 40-year-old farmer and the father of eight children.

Wilson said the minister preached at Towle's funeral Monday and that they were reported to have been "the best of friends."

Boston-Maine Railway Has First Fatality To Passenger Since 1918

NASHUA, N. H. (AP)—A crack Montreal-Boston express derailed, overturned and smashed into a mass of wreckage at dawn Friday in the union railroad station yard here.

One passenger was killed and 21 were injured. It was the first fatality to a passenger on the Boston and Maine railroad since 1918. Cause of the wreckage was not determined immediately.

No Tax Cuts, Prime Minister Tells CCL Seeking Anti-Unemployment Program

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Congress of Labor, calling for an anti-unemployment program involving tax cuts and social security measures, was told by Prime Minister St. Laurent Friday that defence spending is to remain high.

There will be "some slight reduction" in the coming defence budget, Mr. St. Laurent said, but any drop in defence spending will be "pretty small."

The prime minister addressed an 80-man CCL delegation after the congress delivered its annual legislative brief placing emphasis on unemployment and predicting Canada's jobless this winter will be far higher than the post-war peak of the last cold weather season.

IN RECESSION; CCL — "We are in the midst of an unmistakable recession," said the CCL brief read by secretary-treasurer Donald MacDonald. "It is no longer a possible danger, as it was a year ago. It is a fact. The crisis affects every major sector of the economy."

Mr. St. Laurent replied that the picture in Canada is "rather less gloomy" than stated by the congress.

Dealing with requests for more government spending on social measures and public investment to stimulate work, he said the government would be glad to accept many proposals but must bear in mind that the money has to come out of taxes.

WANT FEDERAL ACTION

In its anti-unemployment submission, the 400,000-member congress proposed a multi-angled scheme of federal action to hold the line on jobs, declaring that "there is no getting away from the fact that unemployment this winter will be far higher than last winter."

At the post-war unemployment peak of last March, the government reported 570,000 persons were looking for work through National Employment Service. The bureau of statistics estimated 318,000 were actually out of work. On the basis of 1954 figures, the CCL estimated the comparable figures for the coming winter could be 857,000 and 632,000.

Mr. St. Laurent made no direct comment on the figures Friday, but Tuesday he told the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada the government does not think unemployment this winter will be as severe

Wishing Well Aids Red Cross By Some \$260

Coins tossed into Col. E. W. Johnstone's "Wishing Well" at his home in Burlington by some 5,000 visitors to this Prince Edward Island show place during the past summer have swelled provincial Red Cross funds by \$260.00. These coins weighed 36 pounds according to the statement made by Colonel Johnstone when he brought this splendid amount of money to Red Cross headquarters earlier this week.

This novel "Wishing Well" has contributed over \$600.00 from "well wishers" to the Canadian Red Cross in the past five years. It is only one of the beautifully constructed stone miniatures to be seen in Colonel Johnstone's most attractive gardens which each year are drawing more and more visitors.

OSHKOSH, Wis. (AP)—Final distribution has been ordered of the \$142,000 estate of an Oshkosh woman who bequeathed it all to a New York man she met by chance in 1950 and never saw again.

However, Walter Patri of Oshkosh, co-executor of the estate, said Friday the man, Joseph Kogut of Cuyler, Pa., had received only about \$40,000 from the total estate of Margaret Jorgensen, a dressmaker who died in October, 1951, at 66.

Patri said two brothers and a sister of Miss Jorgensen, who contested the will, each received \$16,000 in a compromise settlement.

He said Miss Jorgensen met Kogut in the elevator of a Chicago hotel in 1950, had dinner with him then never saw him again although their friendship grew through correspondence and telephone talks.
