Season Dates Discussed At Fish, Game Meeting

That the goose and duck season open on October 10th and close on December 5th was favored by the Kings County Branch of the Fish and Game Protection Association at its regular meeting held at the Legion Hall, Montague, last evening. It was also moved that the gun and pheasant season should also open on the same above date, and close on November 21st.

The meeting, presided over by President J. S. DesRoches, was attended by a large number of interested sportsmen, who discussed the season dates at length before arriving at the above conclusion. Many were dissatisfied with the present opening date of October 1st, as the birds were considered immature, and that the closing date was too soon in respect to the goose season. Yet all favoured the one opening date, otherwise some gunners might shoot geese before that particular season was open.

The question of the use of the 22 rifle received much discussion, and it was moved that it be recommended to the government that all owners of rifles in the province be required to register same with the nearest detachment R.C.M.P., and that the R.C.M.P. instruct the owner in safety precautions and the handling of the weapon, and further that in cases where the R.C.M.P. is not satisfied with the ability of the owner, or the condition of the rifle, that the use of such rifle be prohibited.

The Red Wings' general manager Jack Adams, who was Aurie's coach, called Larry the "most courageous player pound for pound in hockey."

In 1938 when Aurie left the Red Wings, his number "6" was retired from the Detroit roster on orders of Jim Norris, the Wings' late owner.

Never before or since has this been done for a Detroit player. Aurie, of French-Irish parentage, was born in Sudbury, Ont. He came up to Detroit in 1927 to start a 12-year career in the majors. The team then was known as the Detroit Cougars, later the Falcons and finally the Red Wings.
