

# Smallwood Declares Plans For Union Are Succeeding

GRAND FALLS, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood says a newly-formed Brotherhood of Newfoundland Woodworkers (Ind.) will have enough members by the end of this week to open negotiations with the struck Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company. The striking International Woodworkers of America (I.W.A.) says the premier's efforts have flopped.

Mr. Smallwood said Saturday night 1,700 loggers paid their application fees into a fund during the day. About 800 of them signed at an organization meeting held in the town hall, he said.

Another 900 signed before the meeting was held or sent in their application with the \$1 membership fee.

**MEMBERSHIP PREDICTION**  
Mr. Smallwood says the union will have 3,000-4,000 members by the end of the week. He hoped the union would eventually cover all of Newfoundland's 20,000 full- and part-time loggers.

The International Woodworkers of America (I.W.A.) union has been on strike against the A.N.D. Company since Dec. 31. It claims bargaining rights for 6,000 members.

There were 1,200 loggers in the woods when the strike was called. In an interview the premier emphasized that his Liberal government will have no part in the new union. Now that it had been formed it was up to the loggers to carry on.

**TEMPORARY OFFICERS**  
The Saturday meeting elected a temporary slate of officers. Max Lane, Liberal member of the

legislature for White Bay North and president of the Newfoundland Federation of Fishermen (Ind.), was named president. Loggers would elect permanent officers this summer.

Premier Smallwood said: "God help anyone who stands in the way of the loggers. The full weight of the government will be placed behind you."

He told reporters later that representatives of eight local unions, all international and affiliated with the I.W.A., were sitting on the platform with him. They were the eight that quit the district labor council.

The union got its fund started by bus and taxi drivers who refused to accept payment for driving into town and back. In some cases the distances involved were over 100 miles.

Mr. Smallwood said 40-50 drivers asked that the money be put into a union fund. "Slightly less than half of the drivers refused to accept payment," the other 50 were paid from funds of established unions supporting him, the premier said.

**OTHER OFFICERS**  
The executive also includes Doyle Sharpe, ousted president of the United Steelworkers Union (I.W.A.) at Buchans, Nfld., and immediate past president of the Newfoundland Federation of Labor (I.W.A.).

The steelworkers are supporting the I.W.A. Mr. Sharpe told a steelworkers meeting Thursday night he was opposed to the I.W.A. If they didn't like the stand he was taking they could vote him out. "And that's what they did—they voted him out," Premier Smallwood said Saturday.

An organizer-treasurer post went to A.N.D. mill employee Sterling Thomas, ousted vice-president of the Newfoundland Federation of Labor's central district and suspended president of the now defunct Grand Falls-Gander District Labor Council (I.W.A.).

Mr. Thomas lost his federation and council post for opposing I.W.A. tactics. I.W.A. officials claim he also publicly supported the premier's proposal to send the I.W.A. packing.

The council disbanded Thursday night when eight of 12 unions left the council when the I.W.A. refused to reinstate Mr. Thomas. The I.W.A. immediately suspended the council charter.

**SOLID BACKING**  
Reporters admitted near the end of the closed meeting said the cheering, clapping crowd prepared to be solidly behind the premier.

R.C.M.P. street patrols were strengthened earlier in the day as bus loads of loggers began arriving from outside points. Several hundred spectators stood in front of the town hall and the new union office directly across from it.

The I.W.A. held a meeting of its own at Bishop's Falls nine miles from here, while the premier was getting the new union started. The attendance, estimated by R.C.M.P. to be about 1,000, was so large the meeting had to be held outdoors.

Premier Smallwood said most of those at the I.W.A. meeting were women and children. The I.W.A. said the premier's meeting couldn't have been attended by loggers "because all the loggers are here."

# Summerside Men Are Jailed On Break, Entry Charges

SUMMERSIDE — Two Summerside men received jail sentences when they appeared in Police Court here Saturday morning on break and entry charges.

John "Junior" J. B. Perry received a three-year term in Dorchester Penitentiary while Harvey Hammond Worth was given a one-year sentence in the Prince County Jail.

Both men had pleaded guilty to the charges in court Friday morning after they had been caught red-handed at the scene.
