British Consols Are On

THE highlight of the Prince Edward Island curling season has been reached and Charlottetown Curling Club is the centre of the great activity this week.

Yesterday the British Consols play got underway with 28 rinks seeking to dethrone Charlottetown's Doug Cameron as champion. In all 15 rinks are entered from the capital city, 4 from Summerside, four from the RCAF station and three from Montague. Alberton has not sent a foursome to compete in the provincial curling championships.

THE Cameron rink will be a heavy favorite to retain its crown and represent this province at the Brier in Kitchener early next month. When the chips are down, Doug and his associates are really tough. This quartet has indeed proved itself at Brier competition and last March at Calgary they were the favorites of the fans in the seats.

However, it took a great comeback by the Cameron clan to win the Island title last February. Myron Bell forced Doug to the limit before bowing out of the local playdowns. Myron could be even more dangerous this week and there are plenty of others who are capable of causing major upsets before a finalist is declared.

Double Knockout

THIS is a double knockout affair. Two losses and a rink has 'had it.' Those who own one loss are on dangerous footing but they could rebound and go right through to the finals. Interest is high even now, the second day of the competition, but each day from now on the excitement will be on the increase. By Friday and Saturday the galleries will be packed with spectators.

Odds favor a Charlottetown rink emerging the victor. However don't underestimate the ability of the other 11 rinks. There are a lot of talented performers in those rinks and they could go all the way in this years competition.

After a good night's rest they found the going easy against the league leading Ramblers.

Dee's Boy Voted Horse Of Year

MONCTON (CP) — Dee's Boy, a seven-year-old roan gelding with a 2.05 4-5 mark and the Maritime all-time money winner with \$12,828, was unanimously selected the Maritime horse-of-the-year at the United States Trotting Association's district 11 meeting here Monday.

Owned by Scotian Stables of Dartmouth, Dee's Boy won 17 dashes during the 1961 harness racing season, and was chosen over such horses as Sym's Best, owned by Francis Breaux of Moncton; Amos Frost, owned by William Boyles of Charlottetown; Eben's Ace, owned by Abe Risk of Inverness, N.S.; and Tammany Hall, owned by Octave Casey of Saint John, N.B.

Game time is 3 o'clock sharp. The last time these two teams met was in December in Antigonish and the X-Men won by a mere two points.

Thirteen rinks will bow out of the British Consols competition at Charlottetown Curling rink today.

Thirteen matches are scheduled between rinks that have already tasted defeat. With the double knockout in operation, another loss today means 'curtains' and a trip to the consolation bracket.

Pete Sinclair, Montague, provided the biggest upset in the opening day proceedings when he shaded Dr. Wen Macdonald, Charlottetown 11-10 in a cliff-hanger. Dr. Macdonald, trailing 11-6 entering the eleventh, staged a sensational rally that all but caught the Montague quartet napping. Dr. Wen got pairs in the 11th and 12th and ended the match just one shy of sending it into an extra end.

The defending titlist, skipped by youthful Doug Cameron, won both their games yesterday as did the Myron Bell rink, runner-up in last year's competition.

In their second game last night the Cameron foursome defeated the A. Humphrey quartet of Charlottetown 14-5. The losers conceded the victory to Cameron following the 10th end, extra end.

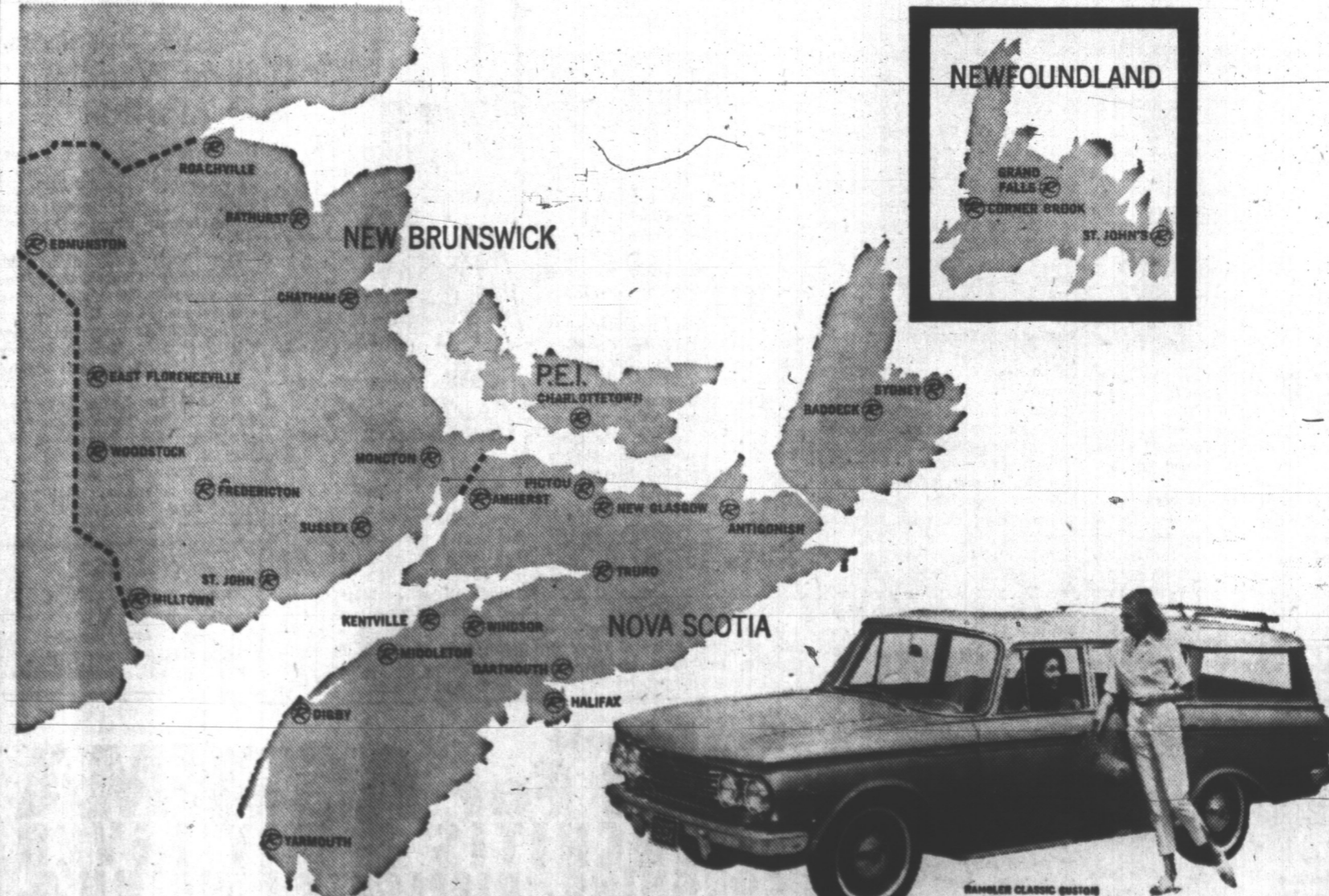
