Both legs and one arm were missing from the body when the horrified parents raked over the ashes of their desolate home. The mother is a daughter of the late Ben Christmas, and is scarcely sixteen years of age.

A TELEGRAM received yesterday afternoon, too late for insertion in THE EXAMINER, contains the information that the schooner George Harold, of Lockport, N. S., 93 tons, N. H. Lyons, master, grounded on a shoal, while going into Grand River, on Thursday. She afterwards floated but sprung a leak and sunk in two fathoms of water. The crew were safely landed. The vessel is owned by Kenney & Johnstone, and was chartered by Mr. Hugh McLellan, of Dundas, to load potatoes for Boston.

THE schooner Herman Babson, the last vessel of the Bay fleet, arrived at Gloucester on the 18th inst., having been absent ten weeks, getting only one barrel of mackerel. This closes the Gloucester mackerel season. The catch at all ports is estimated at less than 80,000 barrels. Many of the fleet have not paid expenses, while others have made good stocks. The schooner Lizzie N. Center this season stocked \$19,439 and is high line of the fleet. The A. R. Clitenden, since the middle of June, has made three voyages to the North Bay, procuring a full fare each time and stocking \$14,000. The Nellie R. Rowe, in mackerel fishing, stocked \$14,000, the Emma W. Brown and the new schooner Baidler made two trips to the North Bay and stocked \$9,000. The N. A. Barton, halibut fishing, which stocked \$16,000, is the smallest vessel engaged in that branch of fishing.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Letter from Mr. L. H. Davies, M. P.

Sir,—Mr. D. Ferguson, apparently for the purpose of diverting public attention from the serious charges preferred against him by Mr. Annear, seeks to open a controversy with me. Avoiding the more important questions discussed at the Murray Harbor Road and other meetings, he fastens upon three comparatively unimportant points, and endeavors to show that I made inaccurate statements.

As to the exact amount paid for the spoils on the Provincial Building Mr. Morrison's letter shows it to have been \$5,237. Speaking from memory I overestimated that item of expenditure, and charged to it alone a sum which embraced other expenditure on the Provincial Building besides the spoils.

As to the other statements Mr. Ferguson charges me with making, I entirely deny having made them. Mr. Ferguson, in replying to me at the meeting, charged me with having stated that "My Government never spent a dollar without a vote of Parliament, and without public sale and tender."

This habit of putting words into his opponents' mouths never used by him, is one that Mr. Ferguson constantly resorts to. It's a cheap, but rather disreputable way of appearing to make a point. I at once rose and sought to correct him. He refused to allow me to do so. At the close of his speech I made the explicit statement that the words he charged me with using had not been used by me, and that Mr. Ferguson must have known it. It's perfectly childish, in the face of my previous repudiation, to repeat the coined statement in print and then by quoting from the public accounts, show its inaccuracy.

As to charge No. 3, that I stated "the order of the Commission of Pub. Works of 26th October, 1878 was not sent to all supervisors, but to one who had overdrawn his account." I have simply to say again that I never made any such statement. On the contrary, I distinctly said that the circular was sent to all those whose accounts were overdrawn. Mr. Morrison's letter confirms the literal accuracy of my statement, and the circular itself, on its very face says: "I am instructed to inform you that your account is overdrawn and that you are not to draw during the balance of the present year any further orders without special notice."

From the fact that Mr. Ferguson, in speaking in local politics, almost always cites the circular as an example of ill doing on the part of the Davies Government, I assume that he must think it would have been discreet and prudent to have allowed the Supervisors to continue drawing irrespective of the state of their accounts. I differ with him. I think the circular just the document that should have been sent, and that when subordinate officers have spent the money voted for them, it becomes the duty of the head of the department at once to notify them and stop further expenditure.
