NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market ran into some mild profit taking Tuesday but despite this it was another great session for the trading element and turnover was heavy.
The Dow Jones industrial average made a close approach to its historic closing peak of 939.62 reached last May 14, but didn't quite make it and slipped to a loss of 2.03 at 935.85.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks took a moderate loss of 6 at 345.5 with industrial off 1 1/2 rails off 4 and utilities unchanged.
SCM Corp. which sold at 16 1/2 earlier this year, headed the most active list, rising 2 1/2 to 50 1/2 on 397,700 shares.

Among Canadian issues, Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk Mining were each up 1/2. Down 1/2 each were Distillers Seagrams and International Nickel.
Prices declined irregularly on the American exchange. Molybdenite was down 1/2 while Canadian Javelin dropped 1/2. Canadian Marconi was up 1/2 and Brazilian Tracta up 1/2.

Papers were off 0.32 at 123.82.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP)—Industrial failed to find buying support in the afternoon session after a morning of gains and took fractional losses in light to moderate stock exchange trading Tuesday.

The main list was dotted with small falls, many of them reverses to the morning trend.
D'Elona was an exception among speculatives. It traded 112,464 shares and rose 1 to 24 cents.

Among industrials, Consolidated Paper, Great Lakes Power and MacMillan Bloedel each fell 1/2 to 40 1/2, 32 1/2 and 29 1/2, respectively, while Moore Corp and Power Corp. each lost the same amount to 73 1/2 and 13 1/2.

Bell Telephone and Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce each clipped 1/2 to 58 1/2 and 63 1/2 and Canadian Breweries 1/2 to 8 1/2.

Senior base metals gained ground. Falconbridge rose 1 1/2 to 10 1/2 and Denison 3/4 to 34 1/2.
Labrador advanced 1 1/2 to 35 but Hudson Bay fell 1/2 to 67 1/2.

On index, industrials fell 2 1/2 to 167.94, the Toronto Stock Exchange index 30 to 157.69, golds 95 to 159.02 and western oils 63 to 99.28. Base metals rose 5 1/2 to 80.15.

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Speedup Suggested In World Money Reform

WASHINGTON (CP)—Finance Minister Walter Gordon of Canada suggested Tuesday that discussions on reform in the international monetary system be speeded up.

"We cannot wait until the need for action is upon us before reaching agreement upon the most appropriate solution," Gordon told the joint annual meeting of the International Monetary Fund and World Bank.

A main issue is the adequacy of world credit and sound currencies for international dealings.
"No country has a greater stake than Canada in world conditions," he said.

The maintenance of a high and expanding level of world trade and economic growth is of vital interest to us.

That growth hinged on enough sound currency and credit plus enough capital for developing countries.

Gordon also said "Canada will play its full part in replenishing the bank agency which is concentrating now on longer-term, less-costly or 'soft' loans for developing nations.

Gordon noted that Canada has doubled its authorization for the Inter-American Development Bank with another \$100,000,000 and has expressed willingness to help the proposed Asian Development Bank.

President Johnson's plans for rehabilitating Viet Nam if the war ever stops.

Economic expansion in Canada shows "no sign of abating" and Canada's own reserves are being maintained, partly with the help of the major sale of wheat to Russia, Gordon said.

But Canada needed to export to handle its special kind of balance-of-payments deficit caused by average annual deficits with the United States of \$1,250,000,000.
