# Emica Standards Said Basis For Civilized Soc.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell was guest speaker at the luncheon meeting of Rotary at the Charlottetown Hotel, yesterday. Introduced by chairman, Mr. Justice R.R. Bell, the speaker first spoke briefly regarding the events of the past few days "because few will feel the loss of President Kennedy more keenly than Rotarians throughout the world, who have come to recognize in him a devoted and effective champion of an ideal of Rotary, the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace".

Dr. Campbell spoke at length on the subject of international law which calls for high ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying by each Rotarian of his occupation as a noble form of behaviour towards all other men. "The whole functioning of a civilized society in conditions of peace depends on the observance by members of the various professions and occupations of a high standard of behaviour towards all other men."

The family requests that instead of flowers, mourners will give Mass offerings, or contributions to the Heart Foundation. His remains are resting at the Hennessey Funeral Home from where the funeral will take place Wednesday morning to St. Paul's Church, Parkdale, for Requiem High Mass at 10 o'clock. Interment will be in the Roman Catholic cemetery.

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# Compensation Bd. Denies Charges By Contractor

The Workmen's Compensation Board has denied the claim of Willard Burke of Charlottetown that all parties agreed to "no press release" in the lawsuit with the Langley Fruit Packing plant in Montague last week.

A report attributed to Mr. Burke of Burke Electric said that the board's statements in respect to the shutdown were "unfounded and premature", and that he had personally and professionally relationship.

"Civilized living would be extremely difficult and unpleasant if everybody felt free to transact business by the rule of unrestricted competition or in any manner that is 'within the law'".

## Donald A. MacDonald, MBE, Parkdale, Dies In Hospital

The death occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday morning of Donald A. MacDonald, MBE, in his 53rd year. Born in Glenfianan, he farmed until about 10 years ago. He was awarded the decoration of Member of the Order in the British Empire in 1948, in recognition of the contribution he had made to the poultry industry during the Second World War.

He was president of the Prince Edward Island credit union league in 1944.

Mr. MacDonald moved from the farm in Charlottetown to take over the full-time job of chairman of the P.E.I. potato marketing board. When his efforts to establish centralize marketing for Island potato growers failed, Mr. MacDonald resigned and took over as manager of the Producers Cooperative Association in Charlottetown. He was also secretary for the Island Co-operative Union Limited.

During the past year Mr. MacDonald had been in the province in 1944.

Tied together in a script by Andrew Allan, the sketches were taken from plays by Nicholas Ben Jonson, William Wycherley, William Congreve, Richard Brinsley Sheridan, George Colman and David Garrick, Oscar Wilde, Bernard Shaw and N.J. Simpson.

The presentation was, in effect, a short course in the development of comedy. However, even with the many changes in style, what was funny in Ben Jonson's time is, when well done, funny now.

The most modern selection was a scene from "A Resounding Thistle". Indicative of the type of humor in vogue these days, it was rather like an extended elephant joke, professionally told. In fact, it had an elephant in it. He was too big for the garden. The owners left the grade had been much more satisfactory. And on it went.

Directed by David Gardner, the afternoon's program was a highly entertaining, but serious short excerpts can be frustrating. It is hoped the company will stage some of these plays in their entirety on future tours.
