### Polio Victim, Wants To Meet Some New Friends

Dear Mary Haworth: We moved here to the west coast three weeks ago, from the middle west. I am a young girl, a post-polio victim, and since I am so dependent upon others for everything, I miss very much my good friends back there. Also I miss my spinet piano, which I had to sacrifice because of moving.

It seems that everyone who means anything to me is taken away, in one fashion or another.

Now I must stay alone all day, since we lost our mother and, being a shut-in, it is impossible to meet, or try to make new friends, to replace the old ones. What does one do in this situation? I would be so thrilled to find a clue to help me. F.F. TRY CHURCH

Dear F.F.: It seems to me that the logical reach towards real friendships in the new environment is to affiliate with the church that corresponds to your faith.

If you are a shut-in who can't attend services, you may telephone the pastor (or his secretary) to ask if he will do you the honor of paying you a call. Explain your newcomer status, your post-polio handicap, your wish to get acquainted and mention, also, the recent loss of your mother. I'm sure you won't take a sentimental self-pitying tone (for your letter itself is nicely matter of fact); but do be specific about your situation.

If the pastor is overworked, he may have an assistant curate who shepherds the flock on the visiting circuit; or the church activities may include a special fellowship unit formed to keep in touch with shut-ins. Once you've established contact with this sector of the church's social service, you can begin to weave friendly ties.

**A POSSIBILITY**  
Make yourself useful to the church. Ask for clerical jobs that might be done at home—such as typing, addressing envelopes, handling a telephone chore for a busy committee, and the like.

Suggestion No. 2: Write the United Prayer Tower, Inc., at 5829 Twenty-Seventh Avenue, South, Minneapolis 17, Minn., and ask about the "lanner-bees." As I've heard the story, the P.B.s are a non-denominational, international fellowship of shut-ins, organized informally some years ago by the late Glenn Clark—educator, author, lecturer and churchman—to invest their ample leisure in dedicated prayer for the good of mankind.

Clark whimsically named the prayer fellowship after the special caste of bees that spend their time fanning fresh air into, and stale air out of, the bee hierarchy's community dwelling. He thought of United prayer as a similar service, refreshing the atmosphere of the world. Maybe you can tune in on that work too. M.H.

### Three Ways To Serve The Alaska King Crab

"These maps we have on the walls of the test kitchen are not only decorative, but very useful, Madame," said the Chef. "Today we are finishing extraordinary taste-tests with frozen Alaska King Crab meat in packages. And on the map we can see where it originates."

He picked-up a long kitchen fork and continued: "Follow this fork, Madame, for the habitat of the giant crab. It is found around the waters of the Aleutians, Bristol Bay, Kodiak and Sand Point, Alaska, and here in the Bering Sea.

"This giant Alaska King crab has four pounds of edible meat in its claws and legs, yet it is delicate but firm and has an excellent flavor."

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK**  
Measurements are level; recipes for 4 to 6:

**Alaska King Crab Legs Kebabs:** With a saw blade or heavy sharp knife cut the contents 1 pkg. (12 oz.) frozen Alaska King crab legs into 1 1/2" pieces; thaw. Remove from shell.

Cut stem ends from 1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms or use large canned mushroom crowns.

On skewers or brochettes alternate pieces of crab, mushroom, pieces of tomato and quartered pieces of thin-sliced lemon. Brush with oil or melted butter. Dust with seasoned salt. Suspend over a pan.

Broil 7 min. on one side; turn and broil 5 min. to brown other. Present on a hot platter.

Accompaniment, rice amandine or curried rice.

**Scrambled Eggs Alaska:** Inexpensive yet luxurious. In a 10" skillet melt 1 tbsp. butter. Add 1 pkg. (6 oz.) frozen Alaska crab meat, thawed or flaked with a fork.

Cook over low heat until thoroughly hot. Add 1/2 c. drained, cooled peas.

In a bowl beat 4 Grade A eggs, 4 tsp. water, 1 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. crumbled dried dill and 4 drops Tabasco. Four over the crab meat.

With a spatula, push cooked egg, crab and peas to center, drawing uncooked portion toward edge of pan to finish cooking. Serve at once, garnished with butter-fried croutons.

**DINNER FOR GUESTS:** Vegetable cream soup; hot rolls; Alaska king crab legs Kebabs; rice amandine; asparagus vinaigrette; warm lobster peach tart; raspberry sauce; coffee.

**Tomorrow's Dinner:** Instead of crab legs Kebabs serve scrambled eggs Alaska.

**CHEF'S CRAB SALAD**  
Thaw 1 pkg. (6 oz.) frozen Alaska King crab meat. Peel and section 2 grapefruit and 3 large navel oranges. Chill separately.

To arrange, line chilled salad bowl with crisp lettuce. Put crab meat, grapefruit and orange sections in separate piles on lettuce. Tuck in thin slices of red-skinned apple brushed with lime juice.

Pass cream cheese dressing made by whipping a 3 oz. cream cheese with 1 tsp. each lime juice and milk and adding 1 tsp. pickle relish.

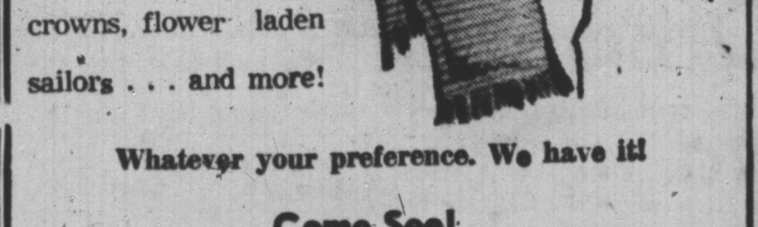
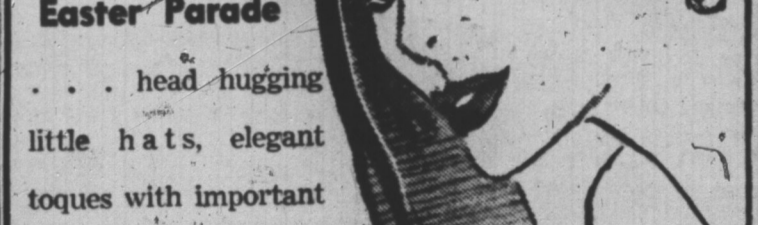
