A NARROW ESCAPE.—During the lightning storm at South Farmington, Annapolis Co., N.S., Saturday morning lightning struck a large hemlock tree and splintered it to pieces. Only a few feet from the tree, 25 men were working on the Torbrook railway near the iron mines. No one was hurt but many were badly scared.

SPRINGHILL'S WATER SUPPLY.—A good source of water supply by gravitation for Springhill is said to have been found in a brook six miles from town, at an elevation of 135 feet.
