Truck Driver Cleared By Inquest At Souris

A coroner's jury in Souris last night exonerated truck driver Francis J. Howlett of any blame in the death of Melvin Reuben Gallant.
Mr. Gallant died in the Souris Hospital, the jury found, from injuries received when struck by a truck on Main Street at the corner of St. James Street on the night of Sept. 17.
It was necessary for the coroner, Dr. G.S.A. Inman, of Montague to have the court room cleared of spectators while Mr. Howlett was giving his testimony due to remarks being passed by the crowd.
Ten other witnesses testified including Dr. Edward Kassner, Souris; Eric MacKenzie, Fortuna Bridge; Roy Coombs, Kensington; Miss Maureen MacKinnon, Little Harbor; Ivan Cherie, Souris; Dr. J.A. Carruthers, Charlottetown; Neil MacIntosh, Souris; Constables Cook and Connolly of the RCMP Souris detachment; Roy Coffin; Souris and Sterling Burke, Fortuna.
Dr. Inman read the autopsy report by Dr. Abel, assistant provincial pathologist, Charlottetown.
The jury included Bruce L. Stewart, foreman; Wendell Birt, Stewart MacAuley, Paul Gallant, John Mullally, Keith MacKenzie and Brenton St. John, all of Souris.

Established as a congregation in 1830 St. Columba's ranks as one of the oldest Presbyterian congregations in Prince Edward Island. The present church building however was not erected until 1864 the original church being destroyed in a storm in 1860.

Alberton Idea Is Discussed

SUMMERSIDE — President A.H. Hubley of the Summerside Board of Trade, or an alternate representative will attend an October 14th meeting in Alberton to discuss an Alberton sponsored idea of organizing a provincial federation of boards of trade.
The Summerside members felt that boards of trade should continue to work together for a common objective but there were too few joint programs in which a federation of boards could maintain an active interest.
It was recalled that a similar organization had failed about ten years ago for this reason.

S'side Trade Board To Seek Cheaper Potato Rail Rates

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
The possibility of establishing cheaper railway rates for carload shipments of potatoes of the various marine shipping terminals of the Island will be investigated by the Summerside Board of Trade.
This was decided upon at the board's regular meeting here last evening.
The suggestion was made by Fred Bingham, chairman of the marine industries and transportation committee, who told the board members that with the possibility of higher trucking rates facing the Island, that it would be a wise move on the part of board members to approach R.G. Greenough, superintendent in regard to the matter.
Mr. Bingham pointed out that if this proposal was accepted it would mean a lot of the farmers, be considerable cheaper and would mean more revenues for the railroad.

With between 400,000 and 450,000 bags of potatoes shipped from Summerside each year and with approximately 95 per cent of the moving done by trucks, he pointed out that the railroad was missing quite a sum of money.
The meeting was presided over by the president A.H. Hubley and the minutes were read by the secretary, Donald MacDonald. Reports were given by James McGregor, membership and entertainment; James S. Wright, industry and development.

In noting there was considerable traffic congestion in front of the Post Office building, R.S. Hinton, expressed the need for another mail depository—a drive in depository situated in the rear of the present building.
Frank Arnett observed that the town is being faced with a number of traffic problems. One, he said was the number of cars parked on both sides of Spring Street in front of a laundry and in front of the Jail on Central Street. This, he said, slowed down traffic and made observation of on-coming traffic very difficult.
Another traffic problem, Mr. Arnett pointed out was that the intersections where Summer, Central and Grandville streets meet with Water street were very dangerous.
"It takes about a half hour to get across Water Street to the other side, he said. "No one will let you go by."
He suggested that a traffic light or a portable stop and go sign be installed at Summer Street intersection as an experiment to see how such a move would work out.
