The Bastards Arms Deal

OTTAWA (CP) — Former prime minister Diefenbaker said today that the Liberal government decided to arm Canada's air force in Europe "with offensive weapons" without consulting Parliament.

Diefenbaker's remarks were made before the NATO ministerial meeting last month in Ottawa and they were confirmed at the NATO meeting.

Mr. Diefenbaker, speaking as a Commons defender, was apparently using the term "offensive weapons" on the basis of reports that Canada's CP-104 jet bombers would be armed with one — medium nuclear bombs.

He said the source of this information is Mr. Justice J. T. Thorson, president of the Exchequer Court of Canada and an outspoken opponent of nuclear weapons for Canadian forces. Mr. Justice Thorson "was not far removed from the ear of the Liberal party."

The Conservative leader also challenged Prime Minister Pearson to say whether the United States is trying to store air-to-air missiles on U.S.-leased bases in Canada and whether negotiations to this end are under way.

Throngs Pay Homage As Pope John Buried

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Roman Catholic Church buried Pope John XXIII, the peasant's son who gave Christendom a new urge for unity and love, in St. Peter's Basilica Thursday night.

The private ceremony came after two days of public viewing of the body, which the Vatican said drew 2,000,000 mourners to the basilica.

To give a glimpse to those in St. Peter's Square who could not get in, the body was borne briefly from the basilica just before the burial.

The 83-year-old pontiff, who died Monday night after four days of agony from a stomach tumor and peritonitis, was laid to rest in a triple coffin of walnut, lead and cypress in a grotto he himself selected two years ago.

However, his last will and testament, disclosed by the Vatican on Friday, had expressed his preference that his remains eventually would be transferred to the Lateran Palace adjoining the Cathedral of St. John Lateran, his see as bishop of Rome.

The church's reverent farewell to John XXIII began four years after he was joyously proclaimed as the new pope.

An unprecedented tide of people — great and humble alike — had thrifted for two days past the body in this supreme pontiff who worked all his adult life for the betterment of man.

Even as death approached Monday, Pope John focused his mind away from the torment of his own flesh and toward the dangers besetting the human world. He told those gathered by the bedside:

"I am afraid, I am afraid. I fear that my children might be once involved in a new war."

Business Incentives Considered Key

OTTAWA (CP) — Finance Minister Gordon will deliver his budget speech in the Commons on Thursday, June 13.

He is scheduled to start his budget address shortly after 4 p.m. EDT.

Canadians then will find out how he proposes to fit Liberal government economic programs into what—barring major tax increases—seems bound to be another budgetary deficit.

As already announced, government spending estimates for the current fiscal year are up five per cent to \$6,545,594,515. This is millions more than the expanding economy will produce in tax yields at present rates.

The Canadian Tax Foundation already has predicted a 1963-64 deficit of at least \$600,000,000. This would follow hard on the heels of a 1962-63 deficit reported to be around \$750,000,000.

Thus general tax cuts are considered improbable, though there may be some levies introduced in some corporate tax measures to provide business incentives.

Gerard Chapdelaine (SC—Sherbrooke) asked Mr. Gordon if his budget will take into account the fact that the Liberal government's fiscal policy is a "debt-free money system" in the last parliament, and if the government favors some method of directing foreign capital into debt rather than equity securities.

Mr. Gordon said he would be glad to answer the question.

Driver Gets Three Years

NEW GLASGOW (CP) — Harold Everett Stewart, 26, of nearby Stellarton was sentenced Thursday to three years in penitentiary after pleading guilty to a charge of criminal negligence in the June 1 highway death of a Westville, N.S., driver.

Stewart was charged following the death of Alex MacDonell, a driver who was struck by a car driven by him.

Magistrate W.A. Richardson said the circumstances were grim.

He pointed out that Stewart was reported by police to have been intoxicated at the time, an unlicensed driver, and had the car without the owner's consent.

The car was not registered for this year and the brakes were not functioning, the magistrate said.

He recommended that Stewart never be allowed to obtain a driver's licence in Nova Scotia.

S' side Firm Gets Contract

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Iran Reports Plot Smashed

TEHRAN, Iran — Premier Ashraf Pahlavi said Thursday the government has smashed a plot aimed at toppling Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi by sabotaging Tehran's vital utilities and educational institutions.

While martial law preserved an uneasy calm following riots in which the death toll has been announced as at least 86, the premier told listeners in a country-wide broadcast that plot leaders had been arrested and would be tried.

FLORIDA COURT DECISION

Cigarette Firms Rued Label For Effects

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Under Florida law, cigarette manufacturers are responsible for any harmful effects arising from the human body, the state Supreme Court ruled Wednesday.

The court said manufacturers were liable for damages when or not "human nature and foresight" they were able to determine the long-range effect of use of their products.

The opinion answered a request of the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of appeals at New Orleans for interpretation of the provisions of Florida law regarding the liability of cigarette manufacturers and distributors.

The Appeals Court granted a rehearing of a suit by Edwin Green of Miami against the American Tobacco Co., charged he had contracted cancer by smoking Lucky Strike cigarettes.

The U.S. District Court in Miami cleared the American Tobacco Company of responsibility for the cancer.

The court said it assumed from the jury verdict in the Green case that although the company was cleared of responsibility, Green's fall case of lung cancer was caused by smoking Lucky Strike cigarettes.

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Restaurant Ass'n Head Criticizes 6¢ Advice

HALIFAX (CP) — The president of the Canadian Restaurant Association Thursday criticized a 6-cent advice handed out for the celebration of Canada's 100th birthday.

Dalton M. Walter of Toronto said national centennial commemoration should be given to restaurant operators to improve their accommodations and overall standards.

He said in an interview Canadians should get down to the serious business of planning in 1967.

"My greatest concern is for '67, and boy, are we going to be embarrassed when the time comes unless we get busy right away. It will take 10 years to get '67."
