The marquee was to the west of Government House. Here rectangular tables were centered with massive silver rose bowls, flanked on either side with rows of flags. One of these bowls belonged to the Hon. B. Earle and Mrs. MacDonald. It had been presented to Mr. MacDonald by the citizens of Charlottetown at the end of his third and final term as mayor.

The other bowl is the property of Mrs. Alan Macmillan. This piece had been presented to Mrs. Macmillan upon the occasion of his fifteenth year with Hyndman and Co.

The flowers in the bowls were in the I.O.D.E. colors—red, white and blue. The flowers used were red roses, large white wax roses,

And in the hush of the morning or the stillness of even, no leaf or blade of grass moves, when all about is in that breathless silence which awaits the nightfall, we love that magic stirring, that little silken rustle in the poplar leaves. Pictured scenes are all—about scenes of the season, scenes of the hayting on these only-ordinary farms that are ours. Lovely items we enjoy by our hearthstone for wherever one is, life ebbs and flows interestingly about. Other lives touch ours.

We hear heart-warming things and find amusing items close at hand. As this morning, Mack laughing merrily at the lively antics of the kid in the orchard to whom he had just carried a pail of water; Alex, a trapped, dead house held at arms length by the very tip of its tail, peep-pattering barefoot after his grandfather to a stable to hear it to a kit-cat there; Granddaughter recounting to us a laughable incident of her work at the hayting.

And also as we have said, some days thrust a sadness upon us. As today. Tonight there is a fresh mound of red in the "Old Kirk" cemetery, at the corner. There this afternoon all that was mortal of a mother of an adjacent community was laid tenderly away to her rest. A farm-girl, a rural store-keeper's wife and widow, and in the turn of the years the mother of one, like

others of us listed as housewives, she could lay no claim to worldly honors won. Yet what a great company of kin, loved ones and friends gathered there at the old church to pay her their last earthly tribute of respect.

So many from miles around and afar who had experienced a kindness at her hands, had admired the bravery of her spirit through illness and known the sincerity of her words and smiles down the years. These are the things remembered and so lovingly, when comes the solemn parting of the ways. These are the memories that remain to bless when the heart is sad and the days lonely for those so bereft. Much loved and respected, a good woman, her life and kindly deeds will live on in those to whom she was an exemplary mother, grandmother, sister and friend.

And another summer week goes. How steadily they continue to pass! It was our Island poet, the late John of The Lilacs, who in a nice thought wrote:

"Summer months are passing swiftly,  
Beauty crowning all around;  
O'er the hills, the lakes, the rivers,

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## REOPENING OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The School year consists of 200 teaching days. School boards and teachers should plan the year so that, exclusive of holidays, the full period of 200 days shall be completed by June 30, 1960. Please note that the earliest closing date allowed will be June 24, 1960.

It is suggested that schools close for the Christmas holidays on December 22 or 23 and reopen on January 4. It would then be possible for schools with a fall vacation of two weeks to reopen on August 24 or 25 and complete the required number of teaching days by June 30, 1960. Under no circumstances should these schools reopen prior to August 18.

Similarly, schools with a fall vacation of three weeks could reopen on August 17 or 18 and complete the required number of teaching days by June 30, 1960. Under no circumstances should these schools reopen prior to August 11.

- Special Requirements: (a) Arts: Latin and French (b) Engineering: Physics and Chemistry. In special cases remedial work is provided for students who do not have complete admission qualifications.

### TODAY'S TREAT

#### MOLDED SHRIMP SALAD

2 cups vegetable juice  
1 tbs. brown sugar  
3 tbs. lemon juice  
1 tbs. unflavored gelatin  
3 tbs. cold water  
1-4 7-8 can shrimp (drain and deveined)  
1 pkg. lime jelly powder  
1 1/2 cups hot water  
1 1/2 cups cottage cheese  
1 1/2 tsp. minced onion  
1 1/2 tsp. lemon juice  
2 tbs. horseradish  
1 tbs. mayonnaise.

Method: Heat vegetable juice, brown sugar and lemon juice. Soften gelatin in cold water, then dissolve in hot water. Chill until partially set. Dip shrimp into gelatin mixture; arrange on sides and bottom of mold. Chill until firm; pour in remaining gelatin mixture; chill until firm. Dissolve lime jelly powder in hot water. Chill until partially set. Beat until light and stir in remaining ingredients. Pour into mold over shrimp layer. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce leaf. (Makes 10 to 12 servings).
