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Barn Destroyed By Fire At Alberton Yesterday

A fire at noon yesterday destroyed a barn belonging to Mr. Arthur Matthews of Alberton, and for a time threatened his home nearby. The shingles of which were scorched, and the adjacent house and barn of Mrs. J. A. Lefurgey, the roof of the barn having caught in several places. A strong wind was blowing in the direction of other dwellings and for a time it was feared that the conflagration might get completely out of control. Shingles on the roof of Mrs. Lefurgey's house curled up from the intensity of the heat.

Members of the Alberton Fire Brigade were on hand but were unable to get the engine of the pumper started in time to be of much assistance in controlling the fire. Upon starting the engine a failure developed in the pumper. A number of volunteers from the large crowd which had quickly assembled on the scene, assisted in pushing the fire truck into position where a ladder could be placed to assist in putting out the flames on the roof of the Lefurgey barn.

Two boys who were playing in the vicinity of the barn are understood to have discovered the fire and spread the alarm. Losses included some clothing which was stored in the building, a meat slicer and other equipment. Mr. Matthews is proprietor of the Alberton Meat Market. It is not known if any insurance was carried.
