MORE BLENDING AT THE SHEDIAC POST OFFICE.—We understand that the mail which left this place on the 19th inst., for New Brunswick, Canada, and the United States, and delivered in the usual manner at the Post Office, Railway station, Shediac, was returned to Charlottetown, unopened, on Thursday evening last.

DRY WEATHER.—The long continuance of dry weather, and the consequent scarcity of water, is causing great inconvenience everywhere throughout the Island.

COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY.—An unusually large number of vessels arrived at this port during the past week, and many more are in the Gut of Canso waiting for a favorable wind, the result of which is that our streets and wharfs present an unusual degree of bustle and activity.

Cleanings from late Papers.

THE ATLANTIC CABLE.—A vessel, it appears, has arrived at Valentia, with seven miles of the shore end of the cable on board. She is called the Stag, and Captain Kell, the commander, is making arrangements to lay this portion of the wire with all possible speed.

ART AND THE PRINCESS ROYAL.—The Princess Frederick William of Prussia sedulously cultivates her talents as an artist in her new home. The Princess makes practical use of her skill in drawing; in the furnishing and decoration of her residence, and is having a new studio fitted up in the new palace in Berlin.

THE LORD RECTORSHIP OF GLASGOW UNIVERSITY.—We understand that the members of the Conservative Club of the University have agreed to bring forward the Right Hon. Benjamin Disraeli as a candidate for the office of Lord Rector, as successor to Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton.

The captain of a Dutch barque informs a newspaper that, while sailing in the South Atlantic ocean on the 29th June last, a frightful sea monster, 90 feet long and from 25 to 30 feet round, came with such force against the ship as to cause her to tremble all over.

A quantity of arsenic had been used in the manufacture of lozenges, in mistake for a composition named "caff," which is prepared in Derbyshire. Fifteen deaths are reported, and between sixty and seventy persons seriously ill.

There is now not above ten miles of the Egyptian railway unfinished. When it is completed, the expense of conveying the India and China mails will be reduced £20,000 a year.

CALIFORNIA—FRASER RIVER, &c.

The steamship New York, from Bremen 23d, arrived at New York on the 7th inst. She reports heavy westerly gales, and very boisterous weather the entire passage.

The steamship Vigo left New York for Liverpool on the 6th inst. She did not, however, bring the California mails, having made no connection with the mail boat on the Pacific.

The elections in the Northern States are going principally in favor of the Republican Party. New York and Massachusetts have already decided in favor of this ticket.

Several inches of snow fell at Bagnor, Mo., on the 7th inst. On the 6th inst. the boiler of the steam propeller G. H. Fote, plying on the Hudson, exploded a few days ago.

The filibuster Walker arrived at Washington on the 6th inst. His unexpected visit occasioned much surprise. It is rumored there are some extraordinary movements on foot connected with his Nicaragua emigration scheme.

FROM CALIFORNIA BY THE OVERLAND MAIL.—The California overland mail of the 11th ult. arrived at St. Louis on Saturday. The rainy season was setting in in various parts of the State.

The Fraser River excitement was fully exhausted. The steamer Cortez, which left San Francisco on the 9th, took out only 20 passengers, and steamers were returning daily loaded down with disheartened and destitute miners.

A fire at Jamestown, on the night of the 6th, destroyed 27 buildings. Total loss \$250,000.

Business generally had been quiet at San Francisco since the departure of the last steamer.

We cut the following from a late American (Hartford) paper, without holding ourselves responsible for its accuracy: We have a letter from Lieut Tyler, of the U. S. Oregon Army, dated at Oeur d'Alou Mission, Washington Territory, Sept. 15, which is fifteen days later than any other account from there.

The army did not lose a man. The Indians were begging for peace, and complying with all the demands of the U. S. officers. Lieutenant Tyler considers the war in that quarter as ended.

MYSTERIOUS DISCOVERY AT SEA.—A most horrible and mysterious discovery of a wreck at sea is reported by Capt. Farley, of the ship William Singer, arrived yesterday from London. He says that on the 26th of September last, in lat. 38 44, long. 45 57 W., he discovered a wreck to the northward, which proved to be the bark Mayflower, of New York, with bulwarks gone, and nothing standing but the mizzen mast.

GREYTOWN.—H. M. steam-ship 'Leopard' is under orders for Greytown and is expected to leave Port Royal for that destination on Saturday morning. She will be shortly followed by H. M. steamer 'Devastation,' bearing the broad pennant of Commodore Kellet, H. M. steamer 'Valorous,' with Sir Gore Ouseley, Special Minister to Nicaragua, is expected to join the Squadron at Greytown, which will be increased to four steamers, H. M. steamer 'Basilisk' at present lying at that place.

It is believed that there are five United States ships there, with the object of coercing the Nicaraguan government into the ratification of the Cass Yrissari treaty. The ships we have heard named are the Colorado (screw 50 gun frigate), Plymouth, Portsmouth, Jamestown and Sabine.—Jamaica Standard, Sep. 24.
