**Seven Entries Get Away On Ocean Race**

NEW PORT, R.I. (AP) — The first transatlantic sailing race from an American port in 20 years started almost without a hitch here Saturday afternoon.

All seven entries, four West German, two American and a lone Norwegian, were present and accounted for on the starting line off Bremen reef. They set out on their 3,450-mile voyage to Sweden in a 12-knot southwesterly blowing out of leaden skies.

The largest yacht in the fleet, the 56-foot German yawl Peter Von Danzig, manned by a crew of students and alumni from Kiel University, was over the line 30 seconds too soon and had to restart.

The 56-foot yawl Circe, owned by Carl Hovgaard of Rye, N.Y., the 44-foot yawl Schlüssel Von Bremen, manned by members of an ocean racing club in Bremen, and the 47-foot ketch Stravanger of Oslo, Norway, made the line at the gun.

Slightly astern were the brand new 54-foot yawl Carina, owned by Richard Nye of Greenwich, Conn., the 48-foot sloop Orlic, sailed by a cruising club in Hamburg, and the 56-foot yawl Kor-

morán, owned by Willie Bruns of Hamburg.

The Peter Von Danzig is the rated yacht, Stravanger, skippered of four days, 48 minutes and 4 scratch boat and allows the lowest by Dr. Jul Nielsen, the handicap seconds.
