# Island's Population Remains At 107,700

**CAPITAL BUREAU OF THE IRISHMAN**  
OTTAWA — The population of Prince Edward Island remained unchanged at July 1 this year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports in its semi-annual estimate of population.  
The P.E.I. population is estimated at 107,000, the same figure in effect at Jan. 1 this year, on July 1, 1963, and on Jan. 1, 1963, in January and July 1963. The island population was estimated at 106,000 and on June 1, 1961, the date of the census, the population was placed at 105,000 in round figures.  
Canada's total population at July 1 this year was 19,272,000, the bureau reports, an increase of 344,000 since July 1 last year.  
Largest numerical increase was in Ontario with a gain of 142,000. New Brunswick increased by 3,000, Nova Scotia by 3,000 and Newfoundland by 9,000 among the Atlantic Provinces.
