TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 13. Official bulletin, 8.30 a. m.—At the examination of the President at 8 a. m. his temperature was 99.4; pulse 100; respiration 20.

There has been no material change in the President's condition during the last twenty-four hours. He was moved at his own request this forenoon from the bed to an extension chair in which he remained half an hour, and has been less inclined to drowsiness during the day than usual.

Official bulletin, 6 p. m.—At the examination of the President at 12 a. m. to-day, his temperature was 98.7; pulse 100; respiration 20. At the evening dressing, 5.30 p. m., the temperature was 98.4; pulse 100; respiration 20.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Sept. 13. The deciding heat for the senior race in competition for the Chinnery prizes, the trial heats for which came off on Saturday, was rowed this morning on the Thames, from Putney to Mortlake, and resulted in a victory for Robert Boyd, with John Langan second, and John Hawdon third.

The Doncaster September meeting opened to-day. The Champagne stakes were won by Lord Roseberrie's Kermess. It is stated that Hon. Lionel Sackville West, the new British Minister to Washington, will sail on Oct. 13th in the steamer City of Rome, for New York.

MANCHESTER, Sept. 13. At a master spinners' meeting it was reported that there was a general desire of spinners to stop work for one week. The Lancashire mills will probably be closed for that time.

LIMERICK, Sept. 13. The Assistant Inspector General of the Irish Constabulary has arrived and taken charge of the town until Thursday, in connexion with recent disturbances here. Six hundred police are expected and the greatest excitement prevails.

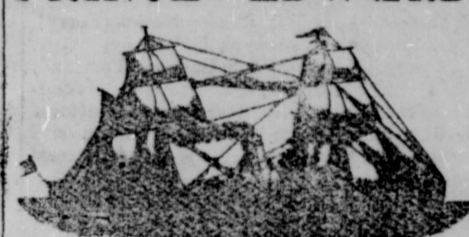
