Rev. George Morris, and Mrs. Morris, Toronto and Granville, P. E. I. paid a brief visit to this village on Monday, 6th.

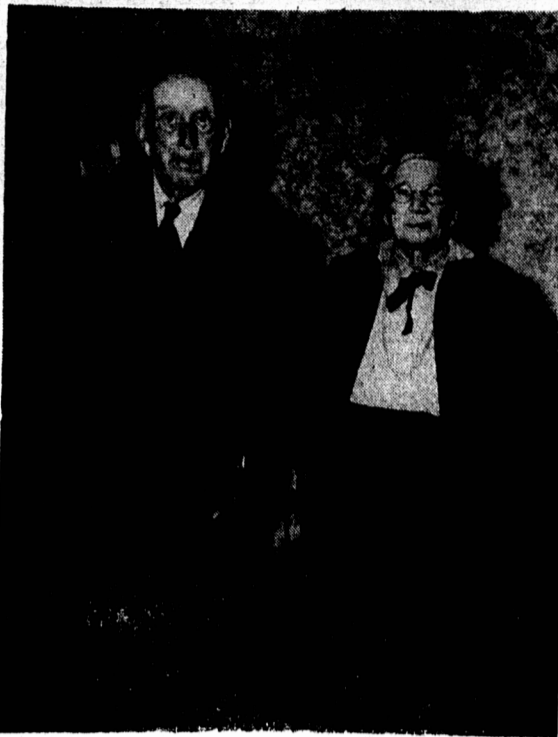
