### AFTER JOSIE MILLS JUVENILE ACTRESS.

(Halifax Herald.)

The Josie Mills dramatic company are advertised to perform in Pictou this evening. An interesting event that has not been billed will likely take place. G. F. Buffer, a police officer, has arrived here from Kentucky in search of a little child alleged to have been taken illegally from the United States by Josie Mills. The child's name is Petty Earlscoot. It is seen that one Mrs. Grimm has a school in Covington, Kentucky, where young girls are trained for the stage. Mrs. Grimm procures most of her pupils from orphanages. Petty Earlscoot was taken from an orphanage by Mrs. Grimm and tutored for the stage. She was hired out to Miss Mills for \$10 per week and expenses. It is alleged that Miss Mills was to forward the money regularly to Mrs. Grimm. It is claimed that Miss Mills signed paper agreeing not to take the girl outside of the United States. Mrs. Grimm learned that the Josie Mills company left the United States and had gone into Canada. They traced the company to Ottawa, and then to Halifax.

In the meantime Miss Mills was written to. She was requested to return the child, and also to pay certain money that was due.

Miss Mills wrote in reply, so it is alleged, that she would not return the child or pay what was due. She said that she had taken legal advice and as Mrs. Grimm was not the mother or legal guardian of the child, the little one could not be taken from her. Miss Mills also wrote to Mrs. Grimm that she had stripped the child in the presence of several members of the company and found that it had been cruelly treated. There were marks on the child's back. She also mentioned in the letter that the child did not want to return.

Sunday G. F. Buffer arrived. He was armed with a power of attorney from Mrs. Grimm, and also with papers from the American consul at Covington. The officer called upon the United States consul-general here, from whom he obtained other papers. He left for Pictou this morning to demand the child.

### CHURCH CONVENTION AT ALBERTON.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Clerical Society of the Church of England was held yesterday afternoon in the rectory at Alberton, and various matters connected with the church were discussed by the clergymen present.

In the evening an able and eloquent sermon was preached by the Rev. T. B. Reagh, rector of Milton, from the text "Walk in Love." The rev. gentleman spoke strongly upon the importance of charity of thought and unity of action on the part of church members.

This forenoon the convention held a meeting and discussed the needs of the Church at Alberton and throughout the Province in respect particularly to finances. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, President of the Convention, occupied the chair. Rev. Messrs. Forbes, Reagh, Harper, and Messrs. F. L. Hazard, Woodman, Webb, Coles and Horne took part in the discussion. A resolution calling for statistics in respect to each congregation in the Province was passed.
