

Huge Government Deficits Forecast For Next 5 Years

TORONTO (CP)—Huge government deficits forecast for the next five years won't be offset by tax increases unless there are so severe as to affect seriously Canadian business and the country's living standard, Premier E. C. Manning of Alberta said Thursday.

He told a joint meeting of the Canadian and Empire clubs of Toronto that he agrees with Premier John Roberts of Ontario on the need for increased tax abatements in the provinces by the federal government.

"But this only shifts the tax burden from one level of government to another. It doesn't put one more red cent in the aggregate revenue funds of all governments. Huge deficits, mostly at the provincial and municipal levels, are inevitable unless there is a reallocation of spending by the private and public sectors of the economy."

He predicted such deficits could amount to more than \$2,000,000,000 over the next five years.

bill, the government would be added up to \$600,000,000 annually. This would do much to pull together the widening ends between public revenues and public expenditures."

Mr. Manning pleaded for a Canadian centennial objective of liberty, unity and prosperity, with as little government interference as possible in personal and corporate freedom.

He said Canada must end her "iragic economic drifting" by mapping realistic definite guidelines for use by individuals, business and governments.

"Governments should specialize in government," he said.

There is a great need to emphasize production if Canada is to prosper. Wages should be related to "true productivity" rather than the cost of living, with wage hikes automatically following increased production. Governments could induce similar production incentives in business by abating corporation taxes as production in a specific business increases, he suggested.

Cuba May Be Encouraging Tough Position By Hanoi

By HENRY S. BRADSHAW MOSCOW (AP)—There are signs that Cuba is encouraging North Viet Nam to take a tough stand against the United States while trying to head off any Soviet moves toward peace in Viet Nam.

This may help explain the indecisive outcome of the Communist summit conference here two weeks ago.

The nine-country meeting discussed the Viet Nam war and what is described as China's obstruction of Communist aid deliveries across Chinese territory to North Viet Nam. China has seemed fearful that extensive Soviet-bloc aid would increase Kremlin influence in Hanoi.

Communist sources suggest the purpose of the conference was to co-ordinate bloc policies for a slow, careful effort to move out of the present deadlock.

This is unconfirmed, although curious variations in the way the Soviet attitude on Viet Nam has been expressed recently tend to support the view.

Cuba's ability directly to block any Soviet peace effort would be limited, but it has supported Hanoi's unyielding line that the war must end in a complete Communist victory. North Vietnamese reassertions of this line sound like rebuffs to the Russians.

MEETING CORDIAL

The summit meeting ended with a calm and like saying opinions had been exchanged on international problems "in an atmosphere of fraternal cordiality and friendship."

Soviet Communist Leader Leonid I. Brezhnev said Tuesday the meeting "was held in a cordial, frank atmosphere."

In the carefully graded scale of Communist communication terms, "frank" means disagreement.

It begins to look more likely that Cuba, one of the nine countries represented, disagreed with the Russians.

Last March the Cuban delegate to the Soviet Communist Party Congress called for the "creation of a military force capable of stopping American bombardments" of North Viet Nam. His militant speech got a cold reception here.

Communist sources said the summit meeting two weeks ago discussed the repeated offer by Soviet-bloc countries to send volunteers to Viet Nam if Hanoi asks for them. But, the sources said, the idea now is dead as a practical possibility, although it might continue as a propaganda ploy.

SEND MEN NOW

The Cuban delegation to the President Osvaldo Dorticos and Defence Minister Raul Castro, went from Moscow to North Korea. There they issued a communique agreeing with North Korea's public attitude that volunteers should go now, despite any obstacles.

Raul Castro attacked "certain people" who give aid to North Viet Nam and try to tell it what to do.

This sounded co-ordinated aid deliveries.

The Cubans went on to Hanoi, joining with North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh in a denunciation of the United States. Meanwhile, back in the Soviet

Union, Brezhnev was speaking about foreign affairs without mentioning the usual tough terms for Viet Nam peace. He mentioned Viet Nam only as an example of things that happen when China falls out with other Communist countries.

DRURY GIVES INFORMATION ON AUTO DEAL

OTTAWA (CP)—The U.S.-Canada auto trade agreement intentionally allows qualifying Canadian manufacturers lacking affiliation abroad to import vehicles duty free, Industry Minister Drury told the Commons.

Mr. Drury, defending the recently disclosed Volkswagen-Studebaker deal, said this clause was included in the two-year-old agreement to help more than 25 small Canadian vehicle producers without corporate affiliation abroad.

Under the agreement, Canadian vehicle manufacturers are permitted to import duty free from any country vehicles and parts equal to the amount of their increased Canadian production.

Studebaker of Canada, which now produces no vehicles, imported 10,000 Volkswagens using credits which had been accumulated from increased Canadian production. The company resold the cars to Volkswagens.

Opposition critics have charged that the deal permitted Volkswagen to avoid duties it should have paid.

Revenue Minister Benson is investigating whether Studebaker and Volkswagen adhered to customs regulations in making the transaction. At a news conference after his speech to the Commons, Mr. Drury said he did not know whether the investigation has been completed.

VANIER GETS NEW AIDE

OTTAWA (CP)—Capt. David Hyman, 27, of the Royal Canadian Artillery succeeds Capt. R. B. Stock of Don Mills, Ont., as aide-de-camp to Governor-General Vanier. It was announced Thursday. Born in Montreal, Capt. Hyman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Percival G. Hyman of Gaspe Harbor, Que. He attended Dalhousie University, Halifax, from 1959-61.
