The Rev. F. W. VROOM left town for St. John yesterday.

UPPER STEWARTS bears around farmers houses and hold inquests on prize mutton.

The erection of the Nova Scotia Steel Works, at New Glasgow, is proceeding rapidly.

The policemen's investigation, demanded by James McDonald, Esq., J. P., will take place to-morrow.

LORD DUFFIN has promised that pilgrims to Mecca will be permitted to traverse the Suez Canal as usual.

REV. DR. TRICK, of Tryon, will preach in the basement of the Methodist Church, this evening, at 7 o'clock.

THREE million dollars worth of the Midland Railway of Canada bonds have been floated in the London markets.

FARMERS in Cornwall, N. S., have been compelled by the weevil to cut their wheat green and store it for fodder.

NO ROBBERY took place at the warehouse of O. Conolly, Esq., or the Bonded Warehouse, as reported yesterday.

The Public Schools opened yesterday, and the attendance is reported to be the largest since the school Act came in force.

MR. R. M. YOUNG, of the Prince Edward Island Railway has returned home from an extended tour in the Maritime Provinces.

The Financial District Meeting of the Methodist Church is at present going on in this city. All ministers are in attendance.

THE news of the summoning of the Royal Munster Fusiliers to Gibraltar—which probably means Egypt—has caused considerable stir in Halifax.

DOG BITES are of frequent occurrence in Moncton, and the town Council talk of making it compulsory to poison the animals with canned corned beef.

A TELEGRAM FROM REGINA, the new capital of the North West Territory, announces the completion of the Canada Pacific Railway to File of Bones River last Saturday.

A ST. JOHN man was overpaid \$4,000 at one of the Banks the other day. He returned the money. A Sackville man was overpaid \$100, and kept it.

UNDER the Ptolemies the famous Alexandrian library, containing 700,000 volumes, was founded—a library destroyed, after an existence of centuries, by the Mohammedans.

AT present 134 engines, 40 passenger cars and over 3000 freight cars are employed on the I. C. R. There were 14 engines in 1874. Canada is bound to go ahead in spite of Grit obstructions.

THE steamer George Shattuck, which arrived at Halifax on Thursday, brought the captain and part of the crew the barque Jardine Brothers, of Miramichi, which was wrecked at St. Pierre, as before reported.

TWO thousand one hundred and eighteen persons, by actual count, were present at the evening service, at the dedication of the Centenary Church, St. John, last Sunday, and all were provided with seats.

MR. S. BRUCE, one of the Government Indian instructors, is in Ottawa, and reports that great progress has been made in instructing the Pigeon Indians in agriculture. One Indian last year sold no less than \$300 worth of potatoes to the Government.

IN a case where the owner of some Weiss beer was charged with having intoxicating liquor in his possession, a Montreal Police Justice took testimony until he learned that the beverage contained 3 per cent. alcohol, when he fined the defendant \$20 for each of the two violations of the revenue law.

DIL. ROBERTSON, just before the Prothonotary's Office closed yesterday, filed a petition praying the court to amend the special return made by the Returning Officer for King's County, or to declare Mr. Austin C. McDonald's election void, for corrupt practices. Messrs. Davies, Sutherland & Weeks are the Attorneys for the petitioner.

AT the Forestry Congress, in Montreal, the Rev. Robert Burnett, of Fictou, read an account of experiments with catnip species, one hundred plants of which were set out in May, 1880. The trees have survived two winters in that high latitude—forty-five degrees—so that there is a possibility that this species can adapt itself to more trying winter conditions than had been supposed possible.

THE "Mutual Benefit Associates" of Rochester, of which so much was heard a few months ago, and which was, according to the believers in that kind of life assurances, in such a flourishing condition, is now a thing of the past. It has joined the almost innumerable host of its fellows in the land of Nod. We are waiting now for its successor here, the Provident Association of Canada to join it.—[In Insurance Society, Aug. 20.]

A NEW COMPANY of Canadian under-writers to be known as the Dominion or Canadian Lloyds is projected in Quebec, in consequence of the extremely high rates now charged by foreign marine insurance companies. A subscription list was opened and \$21,000 each was subscribed by two leading shipping firms towards the capital stock of the enterprise, which is placed at \$3,000,000, with power to increase to \$6,000,000.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Driven from Mandara

A Rush Towards Tel-el-Kebir.

Capture of Arabi's Military Adviser.

Kafrelwar Reinforced

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 28.

The ironclad Monitor has shelled the enemy out of Mandara between Ramleh and Aboukir. The enemy had taken up their position there, and were making new entrenchments; the firing from the ironclad was sharp and decisive, and the shells soon succeeded in dislodging the enemy.

The troops are rapidly advancing towards Tel-el-Kebir; but no news of any decisive engagement has yet been received.

[Tel-el-Kebir, where Arabi has defences on his eastern border (the name means the great mound, being all the remains of some ancient city which stood on the edge of the desert), no doubt presents features calculated for defence. It is about fifteen miles east of Zagazig, and on the line between that place and Ismailia. It will command both the railway and fresh water canal, showing the importance that these will have in the coming struggle. Arabi is massing his forces at Tel-el-Kebir, and making it an entrenched camp.

Exama, where the fresh water canal has been cut, is about fifteen miles still further east towards Ismailia, and it is also spoken of as being fortified. There is a small lake at this place which must contain fresh water. He is reported as having laborers at work all the way from Cairo to Salsheh, a distance of sixty miles. He thus intends to fortify the whole space where attack is possible in that direction. This line of defence runs along where the cultivated land touches the desert.]

The Actions at Magfar, and at Mahata are now known to have been much more disastrous to the enemy than was supposed. Fuller accounts show that the enemy suffered terribly in the action. Arabi's Chief Engineer and military adviser has been captured by the British.

Five transport ships with troops from India, arrived at Suez to-day.

Kafrelwar has been considerably reinforced, and further reserve forces are being formed in Bombay for immediate transportation to Egypt.

RUSSIA AND AUSTRIA.

Terrible Riots at Madras.

LONDON, Aug. 28.

News has been received here that Austria is pressing forward the demands of Russia for the final solution of the Egyptian question. Russia demands the settlement of the question at once, and does not wish to wait until England, flushed with success, is demanding her own terms by right of victory. Austria agrees with Russia, and both countries are moving in concert on the question and wish Europe to decide the same.

Terrible riots have taken place in Madras between the Hindoos and the Mohammedans. Shocking atrocities have been perpetrated by the latter. The authorities are exercised over the danger of the riots, and fear that they will spread.

Whalers arriving at Pentland Firth report the fishery as very successful.

CANADIAN NEWS.

Murder in Montreal—Death of Solicitor General of New Brunswick.

MONTREAL, Aug. 29.

Maria Spearman shot dead a young farmer named McHaffrey, at Gouldbourne near the City of Montreal. Jealousy was the cause of the murder. McHaffrey had been paying his addresses to Maria Spearman, and they were often seen in company. It suddenly transpired that McHaffrey was about to marry another girl. Maria Spearman was driven to desperation and waiting for her false lover—shot him. The murderer has been arrested.

The Honorable John Herbert Crawford, Solicitor General of New Brunswick, being old. He was comparatively young, being only thirty-nine years of age.

P. E. Island Railway. NOTICE.

To Whom it May Concern.

PARTICULAR ATTENTION is called to the following Clauses of "The Government Railway Act, 1881":—

Section 58.—If any person rides, leads or drives any horse or any other animal, or suffers any such horse or other animal to enter upon such Railway, and within the fences and guards, without the consent of some officer or employee of the Department, he shall for every such offence forfeit a sum not exceeding forty dollars, and shall also pay to the party aggrieved all damages sustained thereby. Provided always that no person shall be liable to the said penalty where he rides, leads or drives any horse or other animal over a farm crossing, unless he allows such horse or other animal to loiter unnecessarily or remain upon the Railway, or the appurtenances thereof.

Section 59.—If any person other than those connected with or employed by the Department walks along the track of the Railway, except where the same is laid across or along a highway, he shall for every such offence forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 60.—No horses, sheep, swine or other cattle shall be permitted to be at large upon any highway within half a mile of the intersection of such highway with any railway or grade, unless such cattle are in charge of some person or persons to prevent their loitering or stopping on such highway at such intersection.

Section 61.—All cattle found at large in contravention of the last preceding section may, by any person finding the same at large, be impounded in the nearest pound to the place where the same are so found, and the pound-keeper with whom the same are so impounded shall detain the same in the like manner, and subject to the like regulations as to the care and disposal thereof, as in the case of cattle impounded for trespass on private property.

Section 62.—If the cattle of any person, being at large contrary to the provisions of section sixty, are killed or injured by any train at such point of intersection, he shall not have any action or be entitled to compensation in respect of the same, unless the same are killed or injured through the negligence or wilfulness of some officer, employee or servant of the Department.
