PRESENTATION AT TRINITY—At a meeting of the Session of Trinity Church, Charlottetown, on Sunday morning, Rev. Mr. Ashford, the Pastor, welcomed to the meeting the Rev. Lawrence Toombs, B.A., B.Sc., B.D., who was the preacher at the morning service. Later in the meeting of Session, the Hon. B. W. Death Severs Historical Link

A link with the Fathers of Confederation was severed with the death at St. Joseph's Hospital, Sudbury, recently of Mrs. Margaret Jane Macdonald, widow of the late Judge Aeneas A. Macdonald. Her husband was the son of Hon. Andrew A. Macdonald, one of the Fathers of Confederation. Word of Mrs. Macdonald's death was received by her sister, Mrs. M. E. Walsh of Westmount. The funeral service was held in Christ the King Church, Sudbury.

Mrs. Macdonald, who was in her 78th year, was the daughter of the late John Archibald Macdonald, of Glenadale, P. E. I., and spent many years of her childhood with her uncle, the late Sir William C. Macdonald, of Montreal. She married Judge Macdonald, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and after his death, moved to Creighton Mine, Ont., where she lived with her children. During the two world wars Mrs. Macdonald was active in the work of the Canadian Red Cross.

She is survived by two sons, Reginald A. C. and Allan S. Macdonald; two daughters, Miss Anna M. O. Macdonald and Mrs. Stanley G. Evans, and three grandchildren, all of Creighton Mine. Also surviving are her sister, Mrs. Walsh, and a brother, William A. Macdonald of Cape Breton, N. S.

Former Islander Is Honoured

A Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving was offered by Monsignor J. B. Boland at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Albany, New York, on May 15, 1950, to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Brother A. Paul. His Excellency Bishop Gibbons presided over the ceremonies which were largely attended by many clergy, relatives, friends and former students.

A jubilee dinner given in honor of the occasion by the Brothers of the Albany district followed the Mass.

Brother Paul was born in Peakes Station, P. E. I., May 25, 1874, and entered the Institute of Christian Brothers on May 4, 1890. His years of service include teaching in various La Salle schools at Waltham, Mass., Providence, R. I., Troy and Albany, N. Y. He was noted for his success in preparing students for examination and has devoted himself for over 27 years in the field of boys' welfare. He was director of the New York Catholic Protectors for three years and pro-director of Lincoln Hall for 12 years.

In 1944 he came back to Albany, N. Y., as sub-director, in which capacity he still serves.

Brother Paul has two sisters, one brother and a number of nieces and nephews in the U. S. A. and a host of relatives and friends on P. E. I. who wish him continued success. Mrs. George Macdonald, Orwell Cove, and Miss Eunice, Messrs. Francis and Joseph B. Macdonald of Vernon, P. E. I. are nieces and nephews of Brother Paul.
