FIREMEN CALLED — The Montague Fire Brigade was called out yesterday afternoon to answer a call at the apartment of L. H. Poole. The fire had not gained very much headway and was quickly extinguished. It was discovered that the clapper of the flue had come off and the flame in the flue had set the stud-ting and finish on fire. The odor of smoke gave evidence of the fire and the alarm was immediately sounded. Firemen quickly responded, despite the raging blizzard, and soon had a line of hose run from the wharf. ROADS BLOCKED — Roads in King's County were again blocked yesterday as another snowstorm with high winds filled in deep cuttings in almost every highway which were opened on Saturday following Thursday's storm. Plows did not attempt to clear the roads yesterday. In Montague traffic was at a standstill and only when the firemen were called out to answer the fire alarm were the streets partially broken open. Electric power and telephone services maintained normal operations.

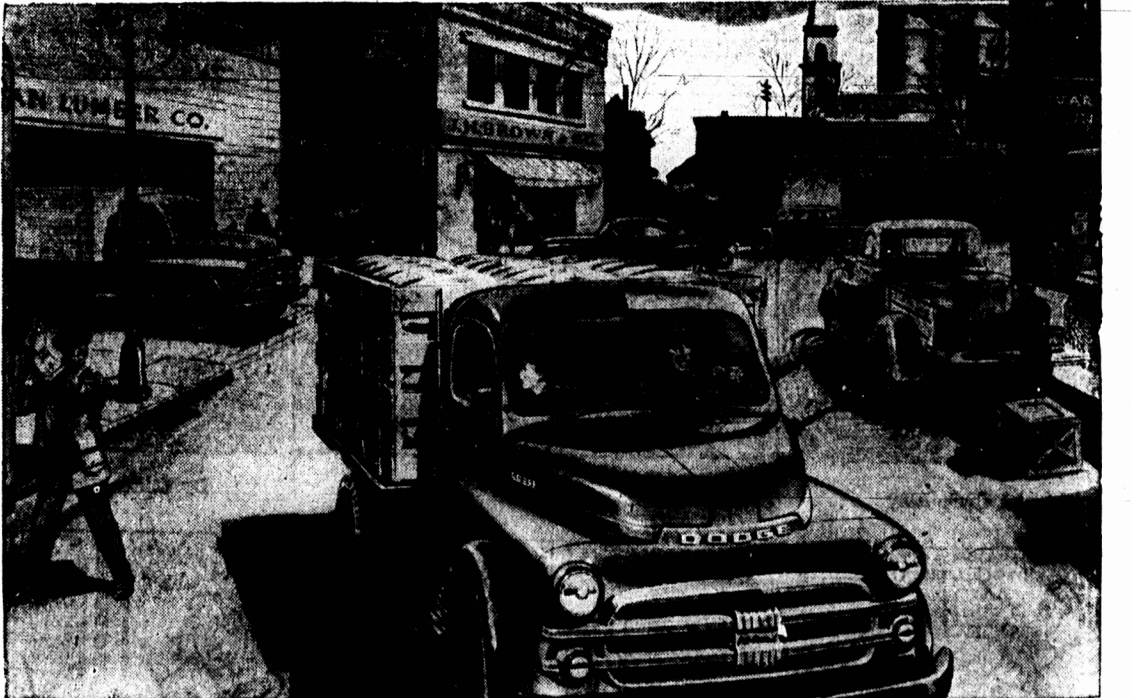
