A TELEGRAM from Cape Traverse says that Irving Allen crossed the Straits yesterday in the height of the storm.

THREE men were summoned before the Stipendiary Magistrate, yesterday, for putting snow on the streets. They were nominally fined.

THE passengers from the West were too late for the Northern Light to-day. Among these were Senator Montgomery, en route for Ottawa.

A LONDON joint stock company, with a capital of one hundred thousand pounds, has purchased the Miller's property, opposite Rimouski, consisting of 80,000 acres, with a frontage of 10 miles on the River St. Lawrence. The company intend to carry on lumber and pulp business, and will build wharves and provide facilities for the loading of vessels. Operations will be commenced at once.

THE Tournament in Citizens' Skating Rink, to-morrow evening, will be one of the best ever held in the city. Competitors are numerous, and the contest is expected to be a most interesting one. A number of skaters have been in training for weeks, and while everyone feels confident of a prize, the winner of the first is yet in the back ground. However, lively practice is going on and, if the affair is well conducted, there is no doubt of its success.

PRESENTATION to a TELEGRAPH OPERATOR.—Miss Haddock, telegraph operator on the N. B. & C. R. R., at McAdam Junction, was presented with a handsome gold chain and pendant and address, by her co-workers, recently, on her departure to spend a short vacation in Charlottetown, P. E. I. Such an evidence of her popularity will no doubt be exceedingly gratifying to Miss Haddock, and render the prospect of her return to the duties of her office in the spring more pleasing than, perhaps, it otherwise would be.—Courier.

A DEN OF INFAMY, we are informed, exists close to Big Point, 1st 65. An illicit liquor traffic is there, kept up Sunday and Monday. The den is convenient to all parts of West River, and is, it is said, patronized by the youth of the surrounding settlements. The evil work performed is alarming the country, and the people living near ask for its removal at any cost. We hope the authorities will take the matter in hand and bring the proprietor of the den to justice.

ON Monday last Edward A. Maher, a student at the Drigo Business College at Augusta, Me., met with a singular death. After eating breakfast, as usual, he retired to his room and soon was taken with a severe fit of coughing. Suddenly he grew black in the face, gasped and fell over dead. It was found that his death was caused by edema of the glottis; that is, in his coughing fit all the air was expelled from the lungs, and the lip of the glottis, or opening at the upper part of the windpipe, closed. There being no interior pressure, the glottis could not open and respiration was impossible.

MR. DORSEY, of the firm of Dorsey, Giff & Co., is at present travelling through the Islands with samples of their manufacture of Boots and Shoes. He reports that prospects are good, and that his samples obtain universal favor from the different merchants, who acknowledge that they are superior to the imported styles and quality, and equally cheap. As a consequence any prejudice that may have existed against local manufacture of Boots and Shoes is being quickly removed. This we are pleased in the case, as all such enterprises help to build up our country, and their success is a matter of interest to everyone desirous of the prosperity of our little Island.

Heavy Snow Storm in Nova Scotia.

RENT REDUCTIONS IN IRELAND!!

HALIFAX, Feb. 1.

A heavy snowstorm commenced at one o'clock this morning, accompanied by a gale, and has continued up to this evening. The roads leading from the city are all badly snowed up, and all exposed streets are blocked with heavy drifts. The trains are delayed.

A North Sydney despatch says the heaviest snow storm experienced for years is now upon us. The roads are very much drifted, and mails will be delayed.

A young man named Dornie, recently stricken down with smallpox, died at Dartmouth this morning. There are no other cases reported.

OTTAWA, Feb. 1.

H. G. O. Ketchum, C. E., is here promoting the scheme for a Ship Railway across the Chignecto. He had an interview with Sir Charles Tupper to-day in regard to the project which has been endorsed by prominent English Engineers.

It is believed that the Government will aid, and place a sum in this year's estimates for that purpose.

The writ for South Simcoe is issued. Nomination on the 9th, and polling on the 16th of February.

The Minister of Agriculture yesterday received the following cablegram from the Colonial Office:

"LONDON, Feb. 1.—The Imperial Government had removed the restrictions which hitherto prevented American cattle from coming into Canada so as to permit American breeding cattle to come in under certain quarantine regulations."

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.

The Herald has a telegram from Lieut. Daneshower at Irkutsk, dated, Jan. 31, in which he says: "Lieut. Dalong's party has been traced to a definite location, on the west side of the Lena. Engineer Melville and the Russians are searching ardently. Lieut. Chipp's boat has not been seen since September."

LOCKPORT, N. S., Feb. 1.

Three flour mills were burned here last night, involving the death of the assistant engineer of the Fire Department, injuring several firemen, and a pecuniary loss of \$10,000.

LOSNOX, Feb. 1.

An immense meeting was held to-night at the Masonic Hall to protest against the persecution of Jews in Russia. Among those present were the Lord Mayor, Earl Shaftesbury, Cardinal Manning, Canon Farrar and others. Forceful addresses were delivered and resolutions adopted censuring the course of Russia towards the Jews.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.

Mayer Grace presided at a crowded meeting in Chickering Hall, to-night, called to express sympathy for the persecuted Jews in Russia.

BOSTON, Feb. 1.

Mrs. Catherine Branch died in this city to-day, in her 112th year.

CORK, Feb. 1.

The Commissioners under the Land Act made some remarkable reductions in rent yesterday; a number being forty-five per cent.
