Firing Up in the Crematory.

DRYING THE MASONRY PREPARATORY TO EXPERIMENTING ON ANIMALS.

The fires in the retorts of the United States crematory at Fresh Pond, L. I., were started on the 23rd inst., with a view to a gradual and thorough drying of the fire-proof mortar, and the 17,000 fire brick used in building the furnaces.

The directors of this crematory believe that a perfect incineration can be made in thirty minutes, but are of the opinion that a perfect bleaching of the ashes cannot be obtained under five hours.

It has been decided to abandon the hollow catafalque wherein the confined body was to lie with a pall thrown over it. The idea was, while the funeral services were conducted the body was to be noiselessly lowered through an opening underneath the catafalque to the retorts below.

My idea is to build a crematory at one end of the cemetery, so that people may select incineration or burial. They believe it makes very little difference what is done with the body after death."

Lottery Thieves.

The post-office laws and regulations forbid the mailing of lottery schemes; through their operation the nefarious business of the swindlers resident in the United States has been largely suppressed. But the thieves have sought another channel, and in it have operated with great success. Here is an illustration: Driven from the United States by prosecution, a band of rich swindlers located in St. Stephens, New Brunswick; from that retreat they sent flaming lottery circulars by the million, all over the United States, but were careful to mail none to the citizens of the country wherein they had located; thus they violated no law of New Brunswick or the Dominion of Canada, and for their stealings from citizens of the United States could not be extradited and punished.

About a year ago one of the shrewdest and richest swindlers in New York went to Europe to look the ground over with a view to finding a point of protection there, and flooding the United States with lottery circulars on the plan of the St. Stephens, New Brunswick, steal. A short time thereafter an associate of this swindler began to take measures for securing the names and addresses of all the farmers and laboring men and women of the United States; this they have done with a fair degree of thoroughness. To these millions of names they propose during the autumn and winter to mail their lottery schemes in sealed envelopes. There will never be a drawing, and never will a prize be sent to any one; it is simply a straight steal.
