SUPREME COURT.
 At the adjourned sitting of the Supreme Court this forenoon all Judges were present.
 Angus McLean, appellant, vs. James C. Ferguson, respondent—Appeal from the judgment of the Judge of the County Court of King's County. Heard at Georgetown last July when judgment was reserved.
 Mr. Justice Hodgson this morning gave judgment dismissing the appeal with costs and confirming the judgment of the court below.
 John J. McKinnon vs. William J. Heater—Action of damages. Tried before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, Trinity Term last, when judgment was given for plaintiff for \$36.18.
 A rule for non-suit was granted same term on the ground that no evidence of the registration of the plaintiff's partnership was given on the trial.
 This rule is today being argued by Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., for plaintiff, and Mr. Morson, Q. C., for defendant.
