way during the time the Scroll of Friendship and Log Book were on the island, and the splendid backing received from the press and radio at all times.

Miss Gladys Hart, International Commissioner, referred to the many countries in which Guiding is thriving, and stated she has endeavored to acquaint all companies and packs with the International phase of Guiding.

Provincial Commissioner of Lone Guides, Miss Carrie Holman, reported that all Patrols of Lones have been visited during the year and as a result, their numbers have increased. The Lones look forward eagerly to receiving their own paper "The Merry-Go-Round" which is compiled locally and forwarded to them four times a year.

Mrs. G. E. Hartlen, Head of Training, commented on the successful Guiders' Training Course which was held during the month of March under the skilled leadership of Mrs. Harry Cudmore, Diploma'd Guider, and said plans are now underway for the holding of a Provincial Training Conference next September.

Miss Suzanne MacKinnon, Provincial Camp Adviser, stated that two Guide Camps were held last summer—at Fernwood and North Rustico—with 106 Guides and 20 Guiders camping. Also, two Guides from New Brunswick attended the Camp at North Rustico while two of our Guides attended one in New Brunswick, Miss Lucille McQuaid, of Summerside, was privileged to act as a Camp Counselor at Jacksonville, Florida, last July and August. Miss MacKinnon also announced that a National Guide Camp is to be held the latter part of July, 1952, near Ottawa, for ten days. It is expected about 1,000 Guides from all over the Dominion will attend it.

Mrs. Morton Dew, Hospitality Chairman, reported that the committee had made arrangements for the holding of the annual and semi-annual meetings, and regretted that their former chairman, Mrs. C. H. Beer, had found it necessary to resign.

The Field Secretary, Mrs. Fred Jenkins, gave a most encouraging report of progress in the Guiding world, but gave most credit to the Brownies who have excelled themselves not only in badge work but also in handicrafts. Guide Laws most strongly stressed during the year were Loyalty and Kindness as no Company or Pack can function successfully without obeying them. Special tribute was paid to all Guiders throughout the Province for the fine work they are doing in training our youth.

Miss Iphigene Arseneault, Division Commissioner for

County, reported an overall increase of fifty members, the total enrollment now being 513.

Mrs. Reginald Holman, Kensington, Division Commissioner for Prince County, also reported an increased membership, but regretted that the Borden Company is not functioning at present. Leaders are urgently needed in Prince County, and it is hoped that before fall activities begin many new ones will be forthcoming. All Guide and Brownie activities were enthusiastically received and well attended, and the Camp to be held in Fernwood during the month of July is now being organized.

Following is the text of the report of the Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. G. F. Hutchison: "As another Girl Guide year comes to a close we look back at our successful Raisin Day, our Camps operated, our Course of Training for Guiders completed, our First Class work re-organized, and all the work of organization undertaken and completed by competent committees in each endeavour—all to the benefit of the Guides and Brownies. One thing must always be kept in mind, that no matter what the work or what detail of the moment is uppermost in our minds, the training of the Guides and Brownies for useful citizenship is the ultimate goal of all the members of the Guide family who work so untiringly each year.

"We are very pleased to welcome Mrs. T. W. L. Prowse, the wife of our Lieutenant-Governor, as our Honorary President. She is a worthy successor to Mrs. Bernard, who always showed a gracious interest in our organization.

"The coming of the Scroll and Log Book to our Province as a gift from British sister Guides to Canadian Guides gave impetus to early autumn guiding. Particularly, that memorable week when it was displayed so that as many Guides and Brownies as possible,

as well as friends of Guiding, were able to see the work which took such time, patience, and talent to complete.

"About the time it left our Province, we were notified that a Log Book was to be compiled as a gift to British Guides from Canadian Guides. Prince Edward Island was allotted eight pages, and in the short time at our disposal our Companies and Packs really showed their ingenuity, creative talent and enthusiasm for the task which they made a pleasure. Upon receipt of these pages in Toronto a letter of acknowledgement was written to me with the comment—"Simply delightful."

"There is no necessity for me to say anything further about our year's work as you have heard it all summed up in individual reports.

"During the year Mrs. R. H. Rogers of Charlottetown and Mrs. Elmer Dunning of Montague have passed away. Mrs. Dunning was unable to be active for some time before her death. Mrs. Rogers had an active part in our work until last spring. Both will be greatly missed in Guiding.

"I announce with regret the resignation of Mrs. F. S. Jenkins, our capable Field Secretary, who for reasons of health feels that after September first she can no longer act in that capacity. All the Guides and Brownies, especially those from country companies and packs, are going to miss her training and her happy self at their meetings. Unless a successor can be found, which at the moment seems very doubtful, each Division and District Commissioner is going to find her next year filled with many new responsibilities and actual work.

"As you will note on your list of nominations, Mrs. Whitehead's resignation takes effect in October at the time of our semi-annual meeting. We regret this very much as efficiency has always been the keynote of her work with us. To her and to Mrs. Jenkins we extend our thanks for work done and regret that it must end.

"Mrs. J. H. Cery is to be the head of our Finance Committee replacing Mrs. D. MacGuire who has done outstanding work. I know Mrs. Cery will have the same whole-hearted support of everyone in her new undertaking.

"During the year each member of the Executive has been a tower of strength to us, and I could not tell you friends of the help, encouragement, and good advice I have received from them. Perhaps other Executive members will forgive me if I mention my Deputy—Mrs. L. E. Prowse—who, as a newcomer to the Guide family, has helped me so much. The
