Special Dispatch to the Examiner. OTTAWA, Jan. 4. The Hudson Bay Company have been selling 20,000 acres per month in Southern Manitoba at an average of \$6. At the last meeting of the Society of Telegraph Engineers and Electricians of London, Eng., upon motion of Mr. Preeco, Electrician to the general post office, Mr. Gisborne, Superintendent of the Telegraph and Signal Service of Canada, was elected a member of the Society.
