### FRANK UDVARI HIS TARGET

## Frank Selke Criticizes Work Of N.H.L. Referee

MONTREAL (CP) - Whatever may be the shortcomings of referee Frank Udvari, persona non grata so far as Montreal fans are concerned, they won't get a full-dress, official airing until the annual meeting of the National Hockey League. That's next June. In the wake of Thursday night's wild game between Montreal Canadiens and Toronto Maple Leafs, with first Udvari and then President Clarence Campbell the object of the fans' roaring demonstration, managing director Frank Selke of Canadiens said Udvari "is not emotionally suited for refereeing. Selke said he will speak his piece when the league heads gather again in conclave. Published reports had quoted Selke as saying that he would protest to the league and to referee-in-chief Carl Voss and ask that Udvari not be sent to Montreal again. "I was quoted to that effect. I was misunderstood," said Selke Friday. "I said I think Voss will have sense enough to know how to act. If he should want to call me and ask my version on the

affair I will certainly tell him." **SORRY ABOUT CAMPBELL** At the same time, Selke said he regretted that the fans had demonstrated against Campbell, who was physically attacked in the same Montreal Forum March 17, 1955. That was the night of the riot, with tear-gas accompaniment that followed Campbell's suspension of Maurice (Rocket) Richard. A penalty given the fiery Richard by Udvari Thursday night sent the already demonstrating fans into an uproar of booing and renewal of tossing programs. At the end of the game scores of hooting fans jammed about the box where Campbell and his wife sat, protected by police and ushers. Selke said it was Voss, not Campbell, who was responsible for Udvari's appointments to Montreal. The referee was under the vocal fire of fans here only a week before. At his home in Kitchener, Ont., Friday Udvari said he had no intention of resigning because of Selke's criticism that the referee is emotionally unsteady. Udvari said he "never felt more like quitting but I feel a lot bet-

ter since I heard from Mr. Campbell" by telephone. **NO DISMISSAL** Meanwhile, Campbell said he didn't think Voss would recommend dismissal of any NHL official as incompetent when an official had been working regularly for a long time in the league. Dismissal of an official would also entail termination of contract. As to any possibility of Voss being asked to keep Udvari out of Montreal, Campbell said: "If any club has the right of exclusion or veto of any official in the club's building, then we would get to the position where automatically we would have no officials at all." Selke said he personally considered Udvari "a grand fellow" and also "a fine referee until he blows his top and then he is emotionally unsteady." "I haven't made a protest, as such, in 51 years of hockey and I'm not going to start now. I have expressed opinions or made objections. That's a different matter. Thursday night's affair is over and done."

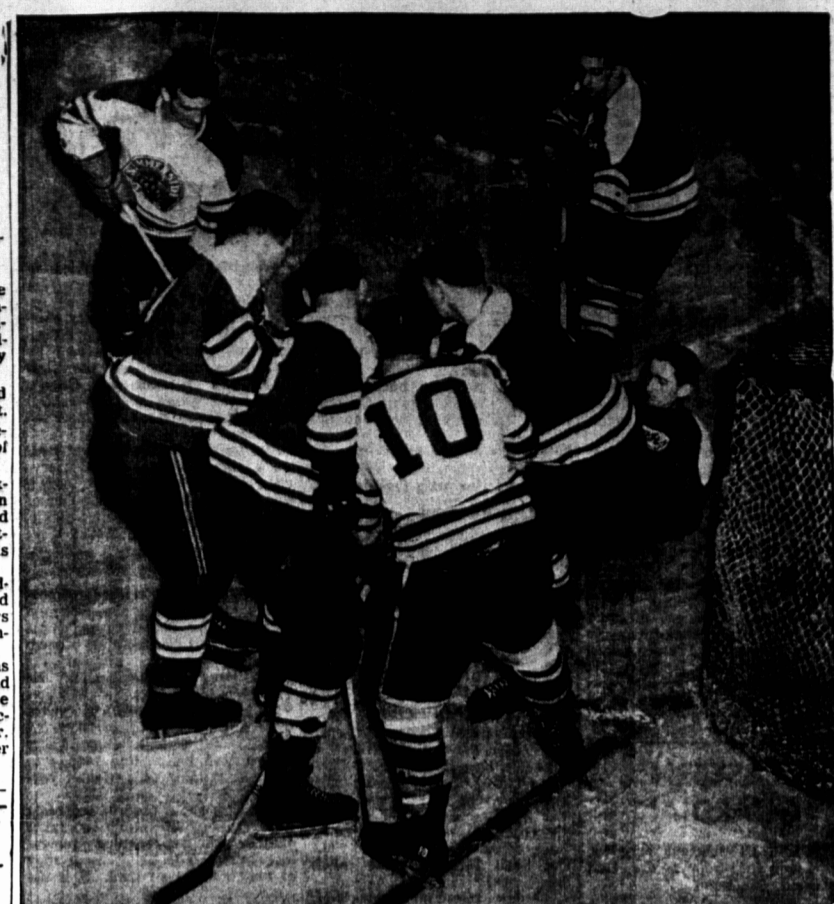

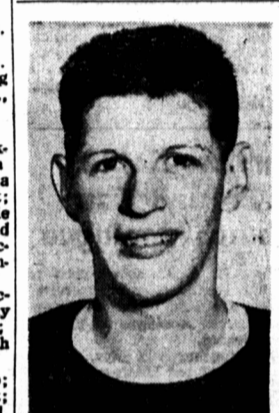


### PRIMROSES HOLD BACK ACES

### HUNTERS' CORNER

#### What Goes On In The Woodlot

The howling blizzard that started Monday night and carried through till late Tuesday afternoon not only blocked highways and disrupted communications but also called a halt to the Rabbit Hunter's Festival. The follow up storm on Thursday night and Friday morning (yesterday) put the finishing touches on what was a good job in the first instance. The countryside is pretty well snowbound at the moment and I feel certain the swamps and woodlands are accessible only with the aid of snowshoes. It was an unexpected storm and sudden and vicious.

Then I heard a hunter speak: "What did you do that for?" a mumble of conversation followed and I caught the words: "I'll look after it." Minutes later the buying of the hounds ceased after two shots rang out. A sixth sense warned me a grouse had died at the first shot. I decided to wait rather than enter the woods. A silent approach is difficult and there were the dogs to consider.

It is an ill wind that blows no body good and the bunnies will have a breather both from the two-legged hunters and predators. The rabbits will burrow deep down into the spruce and juniper thickets where the fox will not be able to follow. Food is rendered more easily obtainable by the deep snow. Equipped with natural snowshoes the rabbits are able to reach succulent buds and other choice fodder near tree top that were unobtainable when the ground was bare, or nearly bare, of snow.
