MOONLIGHT EXCURSION.—The moonlight excursion last night was almost perfectly pleasant. The moonlight and the weather were all that could be desired, and so indeed was the good steamer St. Lawrence. There were about four hundred persons on board. The band only played two selections of music, and many were disappointed in consequence. The sail lasted over three hours and was thoroughly enjoyable.

LARGE TROUT.—A trout weighing 16 pounds and two ounces is alleged to have been caught a short time ago in the English river Itchen, near Winchester. It measured 32 inches in length, 21 inches in circumference, and was not landed until two hours after it was hooked. The bait was a live minnow. The monster is said to have haunted the stream for years. The Catch was made by a laborer named Turpin, who sold it for \$5. It is being stuffed for preservation.

NOVA SCOTIA PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION.—The Provincial Exhibition of Nova Scotia opens at Truro on Tuesday next, the 25th inst. This handsome town will be en fete for a week. The races at the Driving Park are expected to be the most interesting and the largest ever held in the Maritime Provinces. The fine stallion Black Pilot, the Island wonder, is entered for three races. Through return tickets for one first-class fare can be obtained from the Island for the week.

LAUNCH.—At the old ship yard of Mr. Andrew Bell, Mill River, Lot 5, a few days since, was launched the schooner Belle, of 100 tons, built by Mr. William Chaisson, of Rollo Bay, for Mr. Theophilus Gallant. The Belle is said by good judges to be of perfect model, and she will undoubtedly be a good sailor. She is well finished, her spars being of the very best of imported wood, and her whole workmanship reflects great credit on the builder, Mr. Chaisson. Mr. Bell says the launch was the best he ever saw, and he has witnessed a good many.—Journal.

HINT TO TEACHERS.—Prof. S. E. Warren, in the Forum for August, says:—Feeling is the mainspring of action. Elementary education in right feeling, and the consequent willing in the idea and love of health, beauty in life and art, truth, honor, virtue and piety, can be very largely informal and incidental. That is, it need not be a separate text-book study. Every teacher, or other person known to the pupil, in whom right feeling and good will are seen to exist, is an object lesson in the points here named; while, as already shown with respect to other subjects, much can be accomplished in moral instruction in connection with the reading lessons.

KILLED BY A BASE BALL.—About three weeks ago, the 11 year old son of Wm. Cummings, of Pitt street, while playing ball, was struck in the temple by the ball and knocked to the ground. Dr. John Berryman, who attended the boy at the time, says he complained of a headache, but that he refused to tell where the pain was, or what caused it. The lad began to fail rapidly, but he still declined to say what had caused the pain in his head, and the physician could not find any cause for the trouble. One of his companions, however, being kind enough to knock down by the ball, and when his death was announced yesterday, Dr. Berryman said there was no doubt but that the blow was the cause of it.—St. John's Star.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Maritime Press Association.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 19. The Press Association arrived this afternoon. They were met by Mayor Hasen, Secretary for Agriculture Lugin, and the city press representatives.

The Association met to-night at the Barker House, Mr. Bertram presiding. Mr. Lugin addressed the meeting at considerable length. He spoke of the importance of the short line railway via Harvey and Moncton, and said that in the event of the Canada Pacific Railway Company not building it, a New Brunswick capitalist was prepared to immediately take the contract for the proportion of the subsidy given the C. P. R. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:—President, A. C. Bertram, of the North Sydney; C. B. Herald; Vice-Presidents, L. M. Wood, W. L. Cotton, J. A. Black, J. J. Austen, J. E. B. McCready and W. R. Alley; Secretary-Treasurer, J. T. Hawke; Cor. Secretary, William Dennis; Executive Committee, H. T. Stevens, V. A. Landry, L. C. Macnutt, A. C. Mills, F. W. Bowes, S. D. Scott and J. H. Crockett.

The association decided it could not visit Woodstock and Grand Falls this trip, but express hearty thanks to Manager Cram, of the N. B. Railway for the courtesy extended.

Montreal News.

MONTREAL, Sept. 20. Fire this morning did damage to the extent of \$150,000 in Desperes' toy store and Plamendin and Turcot's clothing stores, Notre Dame Street. Loss covered by insurance. The mother and brother of Desperes perished in the flames.

At the nomination for Montreal East today, A. L. Lepine was nominated as the Labor candidate and A. E. Poirier as the Liberal candidate.

A firm from France is about establishing a brass foundry here. They expect to lay out some \$150,000 in machinery and plant. QUEBEC, Sept. 19.

The Governor General and Lieutenant Governor are about competing a friendly yacht race. The match will come off at an early date. His Excellency sailing the Curlew, and the Lieutenant Governor the LaMascotte. Both gentlemen are expert yachtsmen.

Sherman Answered.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19. Mr. Morgan replied to Senator Sherman's speech, telegraphed yesterday, on his resolution instructing the committee on foreign relations to inquire into the relations of the United States with Great Britain and the Dominion of Canada, and to report at the next session such measures as are expedient to promote friendly commercial and political intercourse between these countries and the United States. Senator Morgan thought Mr. Sherman's resolution was unnecessary as the Sherman bill was necessary. We had all the information we needed from Canada. As for Mr. Sherman's beautiful dream of a Zulu river which had grown now into an annexation, that might be realized at the end of another century, unless, indeed, the centralizing federalizers in this country should determine that the United States should be annexed to Canada, and so brought under Imperial Government.

Fatal and Disastrous Cyclone.

HAVANNA, Sept. 19. The Avisador Commercial, giving extended details of the destruction wrought by the recent cyclone, says over 1000 lives were lost on the Island, while the damage to dwellings, shipping, crops and other property extends into millions.

Emin Bey Relief.

BERLIN, Sept. 19. The German Colonial Company have appealed to the public to subscribe to the Emin Bey relief fund, stating that the fund must be raised in ten days, and any support granted by the Reichstadt will be too late.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 19. The official bulletin for the 24 hours ending 6 p. m., gives the new cases, 130; deaths, 14. The total cases to date are 1333; total deaths, 120.
