Local and Other Items.

THE 'PROB.—North and northwest winds; fine Sunday—light variable winds; fine and warm.

BAND DIDN'T PLAY.—The band of the Fourth Regiment did not play in the Gardens last evening because of the unfavorable weather.

CRICKET.—There will be a general meeting of the members of the Phoenix Cricket Club in Dr. Murray's office on Monday evening next at 8 o'clock. As business of importance is to be considered a full attendance is requested.

WILL PURCHASE A PLANT.—The ratepayers of Brockville, Ont., voted on a by-law to raise \$100,000 by debentures for the purchase of the plant of the Brockville Light and Power Co. About one third of the eligible vote was cast, and the by-law was carried by a majority of 404.

SERVICES TO-MORROW.—George's St. Christian Church, preaching at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. by Rev. Geo. Millar.

At the Central Christian Church to-morrow Rev. G. A. Reinl, pastor of a large and progressive Christian Church of Brookton Mass., will speak at both services. Mr. Reinl is one of the ablest preachers of the Christian Church in New England.

LIGHTNING'S PRANKS.—The recent thunder and lightning storm was very severe in some parts of Nova Scotia. At Lower Economy a man named Charles McLellan was killed by lightning while working in a field. The residence of Mrs. O'Brien, at Little Bass River, was struck and damaged by the electric fluid. Half a dozen cows were killed at North River, near Truro.

EXHIBITION NOTES.—\$204 is the handsome sum which is to be awarded to Clydesdale and Shire horses at the exhibition in Charlottetown in September next. \$15 and \$10 are the prizes for pair matched carriage horses at the exhibition in Charlottetown this autumn.

The prizes for standard bred mare with foal at foot at the exhibition here in September will be 1st \$12, 2nd \$8, 3rd \$6.

WAR RELICS.—In Mr. Charles Mitchell's window may be seen some articles that have been brought by Capt. Teylor from Cuba, mementos of the Spanish-American war. They include a block from the derick of "Merrimac," a Spanish Mauser rifle, Mauser bayonet and sword and sheath; also a brass bugle, reaping hook, sugar cane cutter, and a Hotch-Kiss shell.

ILLUSTRATED CHARLOTTETOWN.—The Canadian Trade Review, of Montreal, has been in correspondence with Mr Geo E Hughes, President of the Board of Trade, with reference to preparing an illustrated descriptive article on Charlottetown and the Island. Mr W T Goffe, the association editor, is at present engaged on such an issue for Pictou and New Glasgow. His assistant, Mr John C Kirkwood, arrived last night in Charlottetown to begin work here, and will meet the members of the Board of Trade and Council on Monday to interest them in the proposition and to secure their co-operation. We learn that the Review makes no charge for what it does in this direction but relies solely on increased distribution for its return. Issues have been prepared on various places in Canada, including Newfoundland, Cape Breton, Truro and Halifax. The matter for these articles is usually provided by Councils and Boards of Trade and the information thus published is accurate, and has commanded widespread interest throughout the Dominion.
