QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY.—A royal salute of twenty-one guns will be fired from Fort Edward at noon on Wednesday next by a detachment from No. 1 Battery, G. A., under command of Captain H. M. Davison. BURNING.—A countryman's horse took fright and ran away on Richmond Street on Saturday afternoon. After upsetting the cart and taking a good sized tumble himself, the animal was captured at the Bank of Nova Scotia corner. Both horse and cart were slightly damaged. A LAME DUCK.—SS. City of Ghent called at Souris on Saturday evening last, and reports having passed through a lot of wreckage about two miles off White Point, on the Nova Scotia shore. The hatches, a lot of fish of salmon work such as would belong to a steamship, were floating about; also a boat with her bows cut away. As far as the crew of the City of Ghent could make out, the wreck's name was the S. S. Grandisic, of London, England. A collision is supposed to have taken place. SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER—James H. Keeffe, 48 Olive Street, was born in Prince Edward Island in 1856, and has lived in St. Louis fourteen years. THE FEAST OF PENTECOST.—The Feast of Pentecost was duly observed in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday. Early Mass was celebrated at half-past seven and the children's Mass at half-past eight. At ten o'clock a Pontifical High Mass was celebrated. His Lordship the Bishop officiating. The altar was beautifully decorated for the occasion and every seat was filled. The music rendered by the Cathedral Choir was excellent, and an efficient orchestra consisting of violin, violoncello, piccolo and cornet, contributed largely towards brightening the effect of most of the selections. In St. Peter's Cathedral the services were very bright and impressive, and were rendered with all the splendor and dignity for which St. Peter's is noted. The Holy Eucharist was celebrated at 9 and 11 a. m., the latter service being choral with the Rev. T. H. Hunt as celebrant, officiating in beautiful red vestments richly embroidered with gold. The altar presented a very beautiful appearance, being draped in red hangings and brilliant with flowers and lights. At 7 p. m. Evensong was rendered by the Rev. T. H. Hunt, and a procession brought the services to a close. Able and appropriate sermons were delivered morning and evening by Revs. James Simpson and T. H. Hunt, respectively.

GERMANS AND CZECHS IN THE BOHEMIAN DIET MAKE THINGS LIVELY. According to a despatch from Prague, on Wednesday last, the Bohemian Diet was the scene of a display of violence and disorder unparalleled in the protracted and bitter struggle between the Czech and German elements. A bill was before the Diet which conferred upon the local tribunals at Trautenau certain powers intended to strengthen the position of the Germans as against the Czechs. The young Czechs carried on a resolute filibustering to prevent the passage of the bill. Prince Lobkowitz, president of the Diet, who is an appointee of the Austrian Emperor and therefore attached to the German interest, rebuked the filibusters for their obstructive course and insisted that Herr Funke, whom the committee had selected to report the bill, should be heard. Herr Funke entered the tribune and attempted to speak. Some utterance by Funke was construed by a Czech deputy named Bizoad as alluding in a sarcastic manner to him. He climbed upon the tribune and seized Herr Funke, whom he ejected from the tribune amid the intense delight of the Czechs. Funke, not subdued by his precipitous exit from the tribune, made himself heard on the floor, and was gazing defiance from his enemies when Czech Deputy Vasyt named an ink pot at Funke, but the weapon missed him and was smashed against a desk, the contents being distributed over Funke and a number of others in his vicinity. The Czechs next attacked the stenographers, and maltreated several of them. Prince Lobkowitz was manacled with personal violence, and declared the sitting closed. The Prince has since been occupied in the preliminary arrangements for due to with several of his antagonists. The scene in the Diet caused great excitement. The students of the university broke out in a riotous demonstration, and wrecked the windows of club houses and of mansions of people obnoxious to them. The police are guarding the streets in the vicinity of the building. Emperor Franz Josef has telegraphed to Prague an order closing the present session of the Bohemian Diet. City By-Law.

A By-Law for levying and specifying the rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown, for general civic purposes, under Statute A. Victoria, Chapter 12. BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows: 1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes, under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1893, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of ONE PER CENT, on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of taxation in said City, and of all persons liable to pay Full Tax therein, made and duly returned by them on the seventh day of April, A. D. 1893. 2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such general civic purposes, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1893, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of ONE PER CENT, on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid. A By-Law for allowing a rate of Discount on the Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown, for general civic purposes, for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1893. BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:— 1st. A discount at the rate of two and a half per cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the fifteenth day of June next, A. Every article of Clothing, Store Supplies and Accessories to be furnished, as well as the material therefor, must be of Canadian manufacture, and similar in all respects to the sealed patterns which can be seen at the Militia stores at Ottawa. This does not apply to Helms, Forage Caps, nor to material for saddlery. No tender will be received unless made on a printed form furnished by the Department, nor will a tender be considered if the printed form is altered in any manner whatsoever. Each tender must be accompanied by an account of Chartered Bank, cheques for an amount equal to ten per cent of the total value of the article tendered for, which will be forfeited if the party making the tender declines to sign a contract when called upon to do so. If the tender is not accepted, the cheques will be returned. The Department does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender. A.
