RESPECTING the "Harris Nickel-Plate Circus," which will arrive here on Wednesday, the Halifax Herald says: "The riotous performance last evening was much better than the street parade would lead one to expect. The lady on the tight wire gave a daring performance, and a double trapeze act by a lady and her brother has seldom been surpassed here. The trained elephant "Gypsy," was introduced and performed a number of tricks in an intelligent manner. The trick pony and mule created a great deal of amusement and the clowns with their antics, jokes and funny sayings, helped to keep the audience in the best of humor. The closing act, imitating a new comer into the mysteries of bare back riding, sent the people away laughing. Altogether the show is well worth visiting, and all who desire to spend a pleasant hour or two should attend this afternoon or evening, when the last performance will be given."

Riel's Trial to be Appealed.

MONTREAL, Aug. 11. A mass meeting was held in Montreal yesterday. Seven or eight thousand people were present. The object of the meeting was to secure funds to carry Riel's case to appeal.

Hon. Mr. Leflamme, Minister of Justice in the Mackenzie Cabinet, in a long speech, characterized Riel's trial as a farce.

Another speaker blamed the Halifax Battalion for insulting the French Canadian when leaving Montreal by singing "We've Hang Riel in Quebec City."

The meeting also endorsed a number of petitions for the commutation of Riel's sentence.

Massacre of Christians.

PARIS, Aug. 11.

The Bishop of Quinton reports that five missionaries and many Christians have been massacred in the Provinces of Brendehin and Phyenand. He also reports that eight thousand Christians sought refuge in Quinton which is occupied by the French.

Meeting of the Czar and Emperor of Austria

VIENNA, Aug. 11.

Extensive preparations are being made for the meeting of the Czar of Russia and the Emperor of Austria, which takes place on the 20th inst. at Kremsura, a town in Moravia.

A Rebel Attack.

CAIRO, Aug. 11.

Major Choomside telegraphs that the rebels in July attacked Algidon, fifty miles east of Kassala, and were repulsed with a loss of seven Sheyks and 370 men. The Kassala garrison are famishing.

General Grant's Funeral.

LONDON, Aug. 11.

All the newspapers in this city publish copious accounts of General Grant's funeral. The Times has a lengthy editorial on the obsequies.

Ex-Premier Ferry Threatened.

LYONS, Aug. 11.

Ex-premier Ferry came on a visit to this city yesterday evening. He was followed to the hotel to-day by a mob of several thousand people shouting "Abas Ferry Tonquines."

Drowned.

HALIFAX, Aug. 11.

Alfred Val, the Chief Steward of the Dominion Government steamer Newfield, was drowned in the harbor yesterday.

Black Flags Vanquished.

PARIS, Aug. 11.

General DeCourcy telegraphs from here that the leaders of the Black Flags have been vanquished, and their bands dispersed.
