

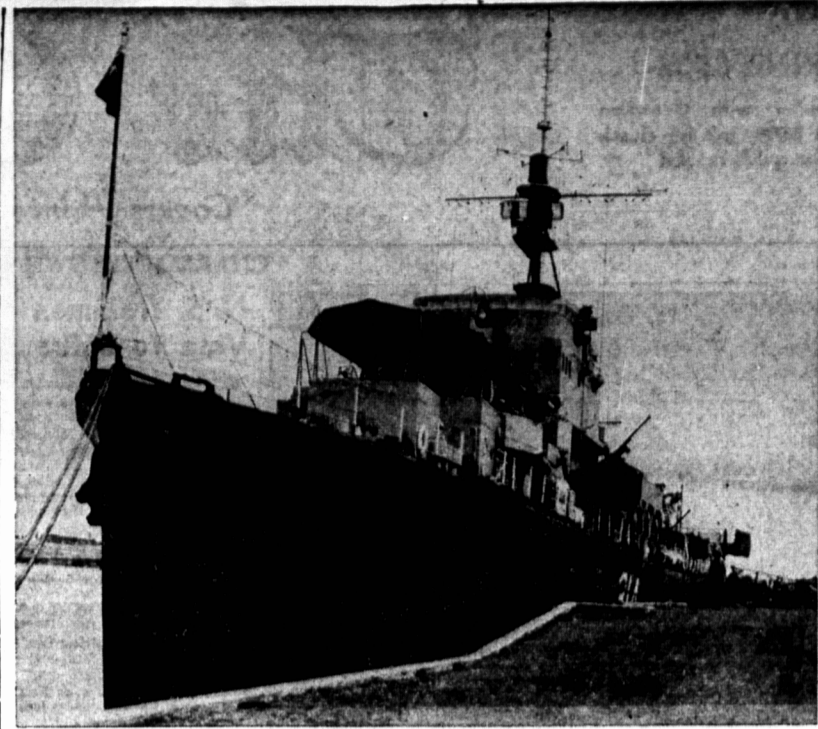
WEATHER

Gadget Inventor Visits City In New "Micro Bus"

William de Sherbinin today is heading back towards his home in Florida after visiting Prince Edward Island and showing how he has converted the Volkswagen Micro-bus into a small house on wheels.

De Sherbinin, the 58 year old creator of more than 50 household gadgets, has converted the bus into a home which comfortably sleeps four people, has hot and cold running water, shower, lounge chairs, cooking stove and kitchen sink.

Included in the rig is a canvas fold-up cabana carried on top of the bus that opens down and gives passengers a large living room. Yet with all of the equipment stowed in every nook and cranny of the auto, four people can ride easily in the bus.

As an inventor he has had more than 30 million of his gadgets sold in the United States, Canada and Mexico and even though he is retired from the head of his manufacturing firm, he still carries three or four new ideas in his head at all times.

De Sherbinin was born in Petrograd, Russia and came to Canada with his parents in 1904. His father spoke 15 languages, read 15 and lectured in eight at Manitoba College.
